

Duck Five Tops Washington

Webfoot Big Men Spark 57-53 Win

Oregon's fired-up Ducks, over the shooting slump which had plagued them in the past three games, turned in a top team performance at McArthur court Saturday night to subdue Washington, 57-53, in an exciting PCC basketball game.

For Steve Belko's white-shirted Webfoots it was the first Conference victory in four tries, but this one win jumped them from out of the Coast basement into sixth place.

For the Huskies it was their first loss to Oregon in the two clubs' last six games.

Once again Washington was led by all-Coaster Doug Smart, Smart put on a dazzling show for the 4884 spectators, as he flipped in ten field goals and seven free throws for a 27-point evening. The 6-7 junior, a third team all-American choice last year, also picked off 13 of his team's 37 rebounds.

But his play was more than offset by two of Oregon's big men, forward Charlie Franklin, and center Hal Duffy.

Franklin topped all Duck scorers with twenty points and led the game's rebounders with 14.

And for Duffy, this was very likely his finest basketball evening. Huge Harold dropped in nine field goals out of 17 attempts for a .530 percentage and 18 points. Indeed, he was almost the whole Oregon show early in the game.

He collected all of the Ducks' first six points and kept them in the running in the game's opening minutes when his teammates could not hit.

Duffy, last year's Conference rebounding champion, matched the mighty Smart in that department with 13. He also had the unenviable job of checking Smart on defense, and while the Husky ace poured through 27 points, no one can say Duffy did a poor job.

The Webfoots appeared headed for another disastrous evening early in the game.

Oregon went scoreless for the first six minutes and 34 seconds. But at this point Belko inserted Jerry Anderson, a 6-4 inch sophomore who has recently been

switched from a forward to guard, into the line-up.

Anderson seemed to provide just the inspiration that his mates needed, and the Ducks slowly began to cut a 9-0 Husky lead.

The teams traded baskets over the next three minutes, Dye's boys holding the nine-point edge with the score 15-6.

Then in the next six minutes the U of W could manage only 8 points, while the Webfoots, paced by Anderson and forward Dale Herron's long, left-handed jump shots, connected for 17 to knot the count at 23 with less than four minutes showing on the clock.

Oregon played cautiously throughout the game, avoiding fast-break opportunities to slow up the pace and set up practiced patterns, and the team's play in the final minutes of the first half was even more deliberate.

The Ducks hooped through five points, while Washington could get only three, and the Webfoots left the floor at half-time with a two-point bulge, 28-26.

Through the final half Oregon slowly upped its lead to five points, and held a 49-44 edge with five minutes remaining. From this point on the excitement rose continually until the game's end.

Jim Greer dropped in a free throw for the Huskies, Bill Stady hit a fielder from the corner, and Smart followed by swishing two gifters. While Washington was picking up these five points, the Webfoots could get only two, on a field goal by Franklin.

With the lead cut to a slim two points, Rask drove in for a lay-up, it came off the front of the rim, but Duffy slapped it down and the margin was back to four, 53-49.

A Husky field goal attempt was wide, finally going out of bounds and when the Ducks put the ball in play with 2:51 remaining, Washington went into a full court press.

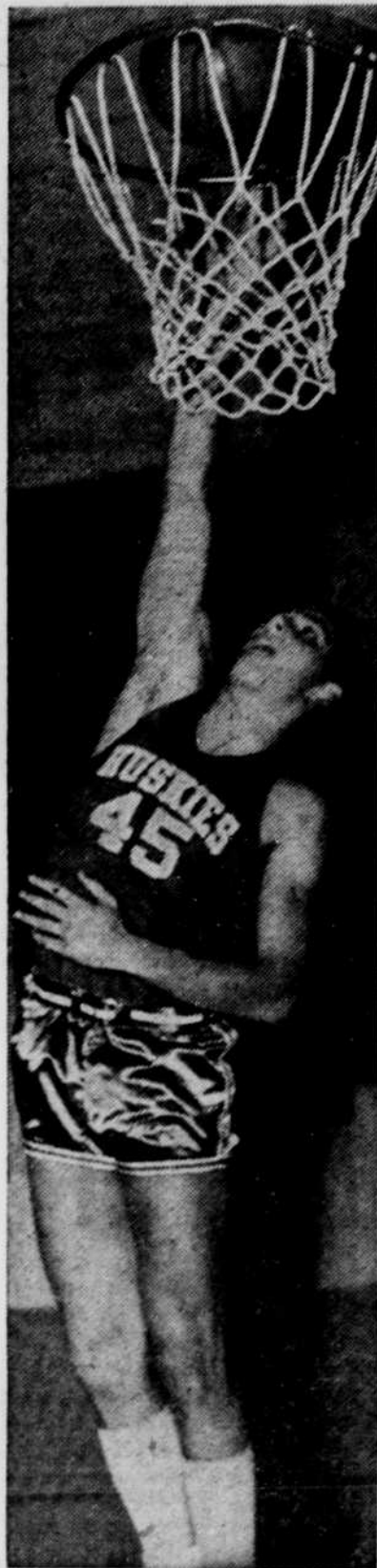
The results were immediate, George Grant intercepted and was fouled by Franklin. Grant hit two free throws and the Ducks lead was again two, 53-51.

However, Franklin got the two back, by drawing a foul and hitting both free shots. The lead was again four, 55-51.

The Huskies' speedy guard Dick Crews, took the ball down and scored, and once again the Oregon margin had been sliced to two, 55-53, this time with only 14 seconds on the clock, and it looked like the Webfoots might blow it.

But Franklin was fouled again, and calmly sank a pair, making it 57-53, with only four seconds left. The game, was in effect over.

And, when you stop to think about it, it was quite a game. The lead changed hands 12 times. Washington shot at a .350 clip, certainly to be considered good basketball, and Oregon was even better with .390. The Ducks

Duckling Hoopers Trip Clark, 71-61

Almost down and out of it before it all started, Oregon's Frosh cagers caught fire after an ice-cube start and blazed on to topple Clark Junior College, 71-61, Friday night at McArthur Court.

The visiting Penguins from Vancouver, Wash., almost found the victory trail in the early minutes of play, as they ran up a crushing 11-0 advantage before the contest was three minutes old.

Had Clark been able to maintain the pace, it wouldn't have been a ball game at all. But the Penguin fire died out as suddenly as it had flared. Seconds later, a Frosh field goal put Oregon on the scoreboard and the Ducklings were on their way.

Consistency was the key-word of the Frosh attack, as Oregon relentlessly hacked away at the Clark lead with precision shooting, especially that of Pudgy Hunt, 6'4" center.

When Hunt hooked in a fielder from the left of the key with 11:01 left, the score stood at 16-14, on the Ducklings' side.

The Oregon overtaking seemed to momentarily revitalize the Clark forces. The Penguins began to march, and by 3:30 remaining had forced the count into a 25-25 deadlock.

Within sixty seconds the Frosh had regained a four-point lead as Hunt netted a jumper and Tim Hidman batted one in on a follow-up. It was Oregon's advantage the rest of the way.

Guards Leon Hayes and Butch Kimpton bucketed field goals to stretch the Frosh margin to a comfortable 37-29 lead at the intermission.

The Ducklings were momentarily in hot water early in the second half when the Penguins connected for five straight two-pointers to close the gap to 40-39.

But Kimpton and Denny Strickland rescued the shaky lead with back-to-back field goals, and the Penguins had been foiled in their last surmountive effort.

With 10:00 left to go the Frosh led 54-46, and had the same point spread six minutes later, this time in the form of 62-54.

Oregon opened the gap to 65-55 with two minutes left, and with one sweep of the second hand to go were coasting to victory atop a 71-59 advantage.

Despite the ragged start, the Ducklings' offensive play was commendable, once the point-making apparatus went into operation.

Scoring was deservedly spread among the starting five, with the second-liners nabbing their share of digits also.

Hunt hauled down the night's scoring laurels with an 18-point effort, garnered primarily on tip-

ins and graceful hooks from outside the key. Kimpton's driving layups and two-handers from far out earned him 13 points, while Murray Newton and Leon Hayes netted nine each, in addition to rebounding well when such situations arose.

Jack Luhrs, Sheldon Berg, Tim Hindman, Paul Bauge and Fred Hartstrom also performed well during their tours of action.

Rangy center Lee Mason led Clark scoring with a dozen markers. Penguins Ken Eilmes and Jim Hollingsworth each racked up 11, in addition to sparking Clark's floor play.

Oregon's win was the second of the current season over the Northern jayseers. Don Kirsch's crew had previously clipped the Penguins' wings, 65-65, in the two five's initial engagement last Tuesday in Vancouver.

The Duckling's next battle looms into view Friday, when the OSC Rooks beckon from the hollow confines of Gill Coliseum.

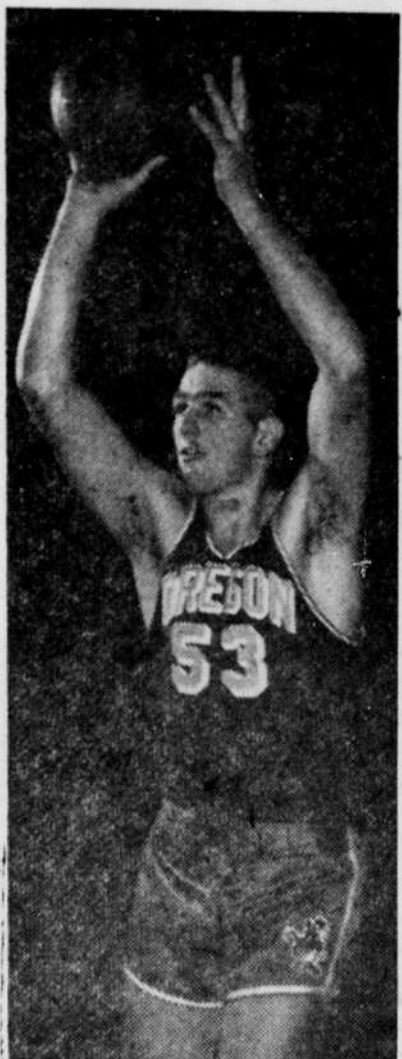
