Rodeo Winds Up; Prize Money Split

DENVER (AP)—Seventy-three winning cowboys relaxed today after splitting \$56,300 in prize money at the National Western Rodeo, which wound up Saturday.

There were 220 competing cowboys who failed to win any money.

Glen Franklin, House, N.M., calf roper, pocketed the biggest amount—\$2,385. The champion all-around cowboy, Duane Howard, 21, of Minnewauken, N.D., won \$2,146.

Third high money winner was Gene Miles, Eugene, Ore., all-around cowboy who excels in steer wrestling, who picked up \$2,003.

Jay Smith, Idaho Falls, Idaho, the top bareback rider, picked up \$2,295.

Woman Shoots Husband, Self

SPRINGFIELD (AP)—A woman wounded her husband, set fire to their home and finally killed herself here early Sunday.

Police ringed the house for one and a half hours after Harman Call, 44, staggered out and said he had been shot by his wife after a quarrel.

He said, he had wrestled from her the .22 caliber pistol with which he had been shot. He brought it along to a neighbor's home, but, before collapsing, warned she had other guns in the house.

Did Not Surrender

Police arrived within minutes, but the woman did not respond to their calls to surrender. They settled down to wait her out.

After an hour smoke began curling up from one section of the house. Firemen were called, but did not attempt to enter the house. A half-hour later several shots were heard inside the house.

Body Found

Police then broke into the flaming structure. While firemen put out the flames, the body of Mrs. Gall was found. Police said she had killed herself with a .22 caliber rifle. The other shots heard apparently were loose bullets exploding in the fire, police said.

Gall, wounded in the stomach, underwent surgery at a Springfield hospital. He was reported in critical condition.

Police said the two were alone in the house when the quarrel started. Mrs. Gall had a son by a previous marriage, but he was away on a baby-sitting job.

deal rationally with the attitudes, guilts, and feelings toward sex which develop during the period of dating?" Does religion deal creatively with the problems of sex before marriage?"

(3) "Is religion concerned with an individuals total concept of 'self'?" Does religion take a realistic approach to man's inability to face the equality of women?" "What does religion say about the man's role of leadership in the home?"

(4) What, in actuality, comprises religion's approach to the great many problems associated with inter-faith marriages?" "When 50% of all marriages are inter-faith, can the leaders of religion simply say that, 'such things shouldn't be'?"

(5) And most important, "Is religion a static thing, or is it a vibrant, vivid celebration of life?" "What is religion's contribution to the understanding that should exist between an individual and his faith?" "Is the church an institution where a young person can seek a realistic answer to his problems concerning love and marriage, or is the church a place of reprimand?"
President O. Meredith Wilson, during his introduction to the evening's speaker, pointed out that if education is to have meaning and significance, the individual student must fit what he, as an individual is together with what he, as a student learns . . . or what the student learns has no significance. Thus, Religious Emphasis Week is a vital part of the student's education.

NBC-TV Cancels PCC Hoop Plans

Oregon's basketball games with Idaho on Feb. 8 and Washington State on Mar. 1 will not be televised over NBC TV as originally scheduled.

The NBC cancelled its contract with the Pacific Coast Conference for the regional television coverage of PCC basketball contests. NBC Sports Director Tom Gallery said that plans for regional telecasts of PCC games were never completed and therefore the program would not be carried this year.

Car Plunge Kills One

Charles V. Lieb, 32, a carpenter on the Priest Rapids Dam project, was killed outright early Sunday when his car went off the road and rolled over four miles north of here.

State Patrolman Cliff Rider said Lieb apparently fell asleep as he was returning alone to Beverly, where he had been living. He was thrown out when the car overturned.

Congressmen Urge Russia-U.S. Pact

PORTLAND (AP)—The United States should seek early agreements with Russia on regulations governing space, two congressmen said here Sunday.

They told a meeting, sponsored by the Oregon United Nations Assn., that space pacts should be negotiated through the United Nations, and that the U.S. should negotiate from a position of military strength.
