trade and aid extended to underdeveloped countries.

He received his B.A. and M.A. in 1936, and his Ph.D. in 1939 from Ohio State university, coming to Oregon in 1957.

Some of his other appointments include consultant to the United States Council of the International Chamber of Commerce, consultant to the Arabian-American Oil Company, consultant to the Council of Economic Advisers, economist in the Treasury Department, and member of the staff of the Council of Economic Advisers in the Executive Office of the President. He was a member of the board of editors of American Economic Review and is on the editorial board of the Middle East Journal.

C.R. "Skeets" Manerud, president of the association, made the announcement this week.



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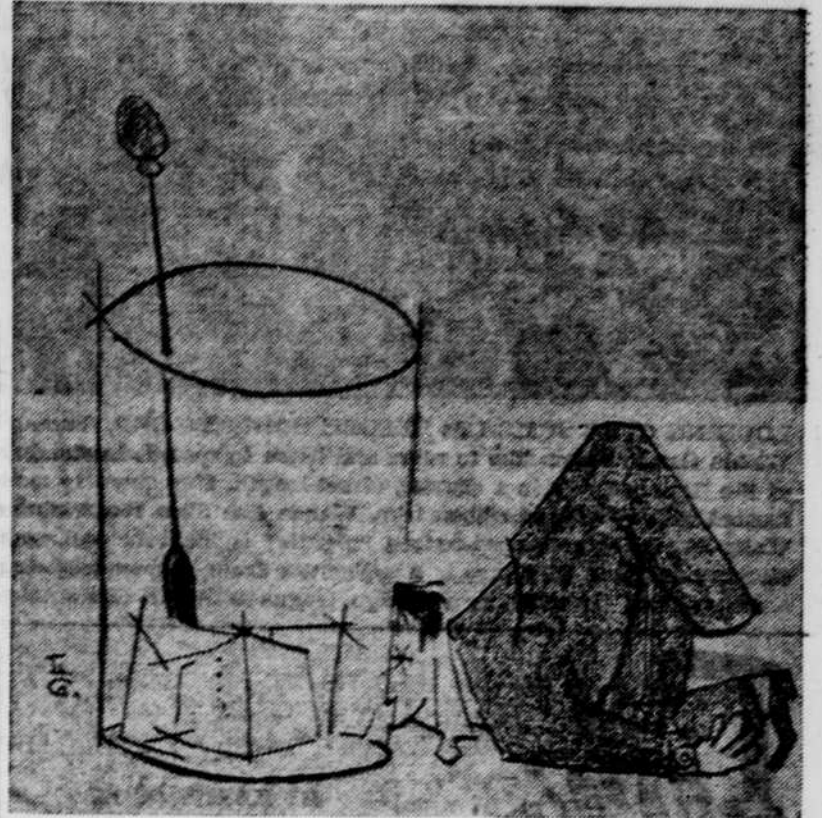
