PCC Schedules Confab in March

LOS ANGELES — A special meeting of the Pacific Coast Conference to consider a new program of financial aid for student athletes will be held March 14 through 16 in San Francisco. It was announced by PCC Commissioner Victor O. Schmidt.

The special meeting, which was authorized by the Conference last December at its Winter meeting, was called by Professor Rixford K. Snyder of Stanford University, the Conference President. It will be held at the Clift Hotel and in attendance will be the Faculty Athletic Representatives and Athletic Directors.

The Conference last December also authorized the appointment of a committee to draft a program covering these points:

- (1) Each institution could award a limited number of grants to student athletes for tuition and subsistence in return for a specified amount of work. A scholastic record somewhat higher than present standards would be required to qualify for this aid and off-campus employment would be prohibited.
- (2) Any student athlete not academically eligible for the aid described in (1) above could continue to receive aid as permitted under present rules, but would be counted in the limited number of student athletes being permitted aid at the institution.
- (3) If feasible, a formula to be developed permitting fewer hours of work than required under (1) above, with a proportionate reduction in the amount of aid, for student athletes who so desire.
- (4) The plan to become effective September 1, 1958.

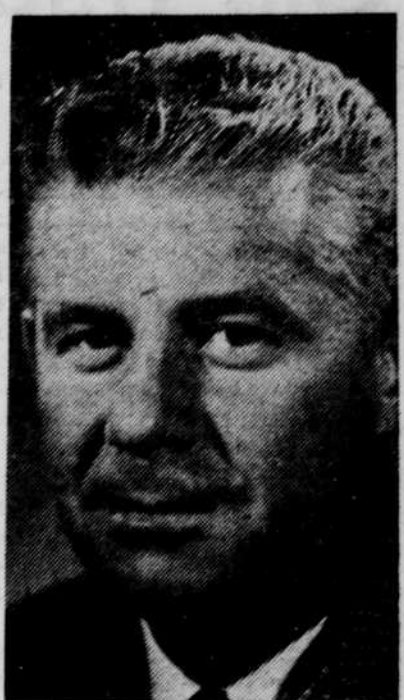
Professor Snyder, as Conference President, subsequently appointed the committee which will report at the March meeting. Chairman is Prof. Donald Wollett of the University of Washington.

The squad appears to be at full strength now, although several of the veterans turned out late for various reasons.

The hot battle for starting berths in the middle weight positions continued to exist and starters were not definite as late as Wednesday.

Acting coaches, Johnny McKay and Jack Roche, who have taken over the handling of the team in the absence of head man Bill Hammer, sent their charges through a light workout Wednesday afternoon.

At the end of the drill expected starters included Gary Parks, sophomore in the 123-pound class; Ron Conner, also a sophomore, 130-pound; Ken Karnes, senior, 137-pound, and heavyweight Jay Wheeler, who was runner-up in the unlimited division in the PCL last season.

Four of six, Howard Timmons, senior; Jay Dearing, junior; Jim Beaton, junior; George Krupicka, senior; Bob Curtis, junior; and Dave Fish, junior; will start in the weight divisions between 147 and 177.

Although Wheeler and Fish, Beaton and Karnes were late in reporting this season, they have been working very hard of late and should definitely be ready for the two coming meets.

And, though they were late in turning out, none of the four has been beaten.

The Frosh, like their big brothers on the varsity, also unbeaten, will make the trip to Portland with the varsity.

The Duckling squad will meet the PSC Frosh prior to the varsity meet Thursday, but will return to Eugene afterwards, rather than continuing on to Pullman.

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
