Family Said Vital

Man was not created to be alone, but rather, as the Jewish faith advocates, the family is all-important. The notion that marriage is a second best to remaining single was denied by Johns.

Inter-faith marriages or mixed marriages pose many problems, Johns warned. The Protestant aim being to educate and counsel young people on the consequences of a mixed marriage. Johns suggested that "there must be a meeting of minds on religious practices before marriage is decided upon."

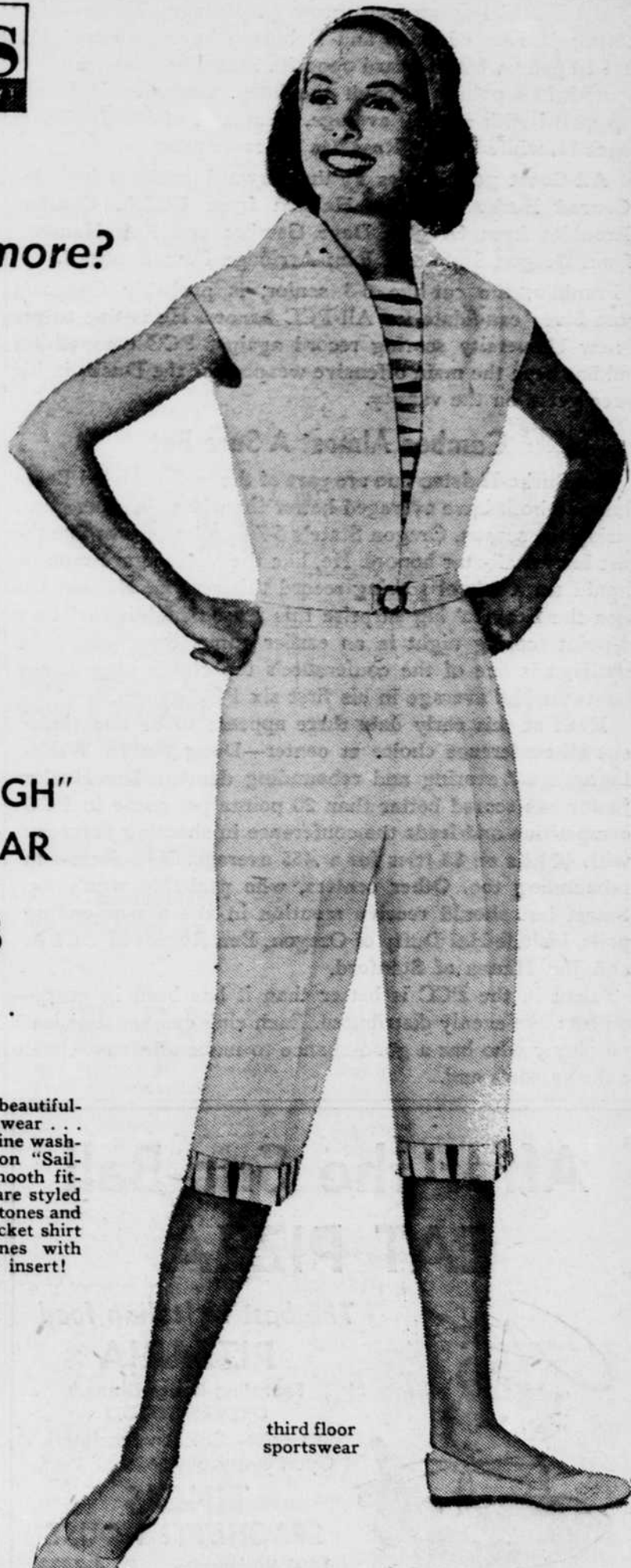
