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DRY ZONE FALLS

Council Approves Liquor Licenses

Three controversial applications for package-beer licenses inside the now-dead "dry zone" around the University were approved Monday night by the Eugene City Council.

Voting on the applications was 4-2, 4-2, and 4-3, in favor.

The applications now go for final approval before the Oregon Liquor Control Commission.

Successful applicants were Foodland, 661 E. 19th Ave.; The Safeway Store, 1840 E. 13th Ave.; and Miller's Grocery, 1065 E. 20th St. A fourth application, that of Hilyard St. Market, 1698 Hilyard,

was referred to committee for further study. The latter application was presented for the first time at Monday's meeting.

The applications were first presented to the City Council in November, at which time they were approved. Officials of the University protested, as the stores were inside of the boundaries of a "dry zone" set up in 1951.

Thornton Asked

An opinion on the legality of the zone was requested from Atty. Gen. Robert Thornton, by the OLCC. Thornton ruled that the dry zone, as set up, was illegal.

In January, a special committee was set up with members representing the University and the City Council. The committee deadlocked on the issue, and the matter again reached the City Council with no specific recommendation.

Resignation of City Councilman Robert Briggs was accepted at the meeting. Among the names mentioned as a possible successor was that of J. Spencer Carlson, director of admissions at the University. Final action on the naming of Briggs' successor will be delayed.

Petitions Called For AWS Offices

Friday is the last day anyone may petition for an AWS office, according to Sue Walcott, AWS president. Petitioners must use an AWS petition blank and turn it in to the ASUO petition box on the third floor of the Student Union by 5 p.m.

Only girls who are presently juniors may petition for president, Miss Walcott said. Runner-up for the top office will automatically become vice president. Sophomore women may run for either secretary or treasurer and freshmen may petition for editor or historian.

Petitions submitted will be read by all senior members of the AWS legislature. On Tuesday the seniors will begin interviewing petitioners in preparation for submitting their slate. The slate will then be presented to all the women voters in an election combined with the YWCA and WRA on Feb. 12.

After the elections, the officers will travel to the state AWS convention at Linfield College on Feb. 15.

Blue-White Party Chairmen Selected

Laurie Scott, Phi Theta Upsilon member, and Judy Keller, Kwama, have been named chairmen of the annual Blue-White party scheduled for Feb. 11.

The party, which will be held in the Carson living room, is held to acquaint freshman and sophomore women with the purpose and activities of the sophomore and junior service honoraries.

Tickets for the contest are now on sale at the Student Union candy counter. Price is 25 cents apiece and students must have them for themselves and their fathers. Intermission signing will be done by the University Singers. A trophy will be presented to the winning quartet.

There is no limit to the number of quartets that may enter from one living organization, Miss Lindley said. It is hoped that freshmen dorms will also enter. Only men's houses may sing.

Ocean Expert Sets Lecture

"The Proportions of Things in the Sea" will be the topic of Albert C. Redfield of the Woods Hole, Mass. Oceanographic Institution Wednesday at 8 p.m. in the Student Union.

Redfield, senior oceanographer emeritus of the institution, is being sponsored by Sigma Xi, national science and mathematics honorary. He has been speaking throughout the West.

Redfield will discuss the circulation patterns of the Atlantic, Pacific, and Indian Oceans, pointing out the similarities of ocean movement with that of river basins, the Norwegian fjords, or the Mediterranean Sea.

He will also point out how the fertility of the various oceans is accounted for both by the amount of organic matter present in the sea and the water flow.

Redfield was born in Philadelphia, Pa., and is a professor emeritus of physiology at Harvard, where he also earned his doctorate degree. He is a trustee of the Woods Hole Oceanographic Institute, the Marine Biological Laboratory, the Boston Society of Natural History and the Bermuda Biological Station.
