And the problem again would be up to the district attorney. The committee would probably be ineffective. If it became a community force, it's hard to imagine it as representing the community's interests very accurately.

Of the three possible methods — Venn's censorship, the citizen's committee or that set up by law—the third, in practice, represents the least evil. Offenders, according to the district attorney's interpretation of the law, should be brought to trial.

In spite of the harsh wording of Oregon statutes about what can be legally presented by the mass media, the likelihood that the law would ever be implemented on a large scale is slim.

With the traditional American hatred of any form of censorship, only the worst offenders would ever get convicted by a jury, even under the present law.

In addition to the fact that juries are legally constituted, they have another advantage over the citizen's committee: a jury's membership is ever-changing, while the committee's membership would remain more or less static as its members grew older.

In dealing with matters which touch so closely on the First Amendment, it's wiser and safer to trust a jury—the legally constituted conscience of the community—than it is to trust any self-styled vigilance committee or district attorney's censorship.

Egypt, Syria Union To Be Announced

CAIRO (AP) — The merger of Egypt and Syria into a single state is reported imminent. The newspaper Al Ahram said President Nasser and Syrian President Sukhri Kuwatly would announce the union soon.

Top Egyptian and Syrian leaders proclaimed the advantages of the proposed federation, and the Cairo press gave it top play. The public emphasis on the plan apparently was timed to take the edge off the opening of the Baghdad Pact conference Monday in Ankara, Turkey.

United Arab State

Al Ahram said Cairo would be the capital, the federation's name would be "the United Arab State" and there would be one government, one parliament and one army.

A plebiscite will be held in Egypt and Syria on the proposed union, Al Ahram said.

Nasser told visiting U.S. newspaper and radio editors Egypt and Syria have agreed on all except minor details.

Syria Pushes Plan

Although Syrian officials have been talking constantly about a federation, Egyptian leaders had not commented officially in recent days. Syria has been pushing the plan since it first was proposed two years ago.

Both Syria and Egypt have received large amounts of Soviet economic and military aid. Their armies already are linked under a joint military command headed by an Egyptian and their foreign policies generally coincide.

Biologist Collects 'Frozen' Eggs

SEATTLE (AP) — Some people might think Arthur H. Arp has a peculiar job. He collects eggs.

Fish eggs. He collects them on snowshoes.

Before you go hopping out to call a psychiatrist, listen to the explanation:

Arp is a biologist with the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service. With Richard L. Major and Donovan R. Craddock of the Bureau of Commercial Fisheries office in Seattle, he is studying the hardihood of blueback salmon eggs in cold Northwest streams.

Trio Plants Eggs

Last October the trio planted batches of eggs in the Wenatchee River of Washington, the Okanogan in British Columbia and Redfish Lake in Idaho. Each "batch" amounted to 100 eggs in a plastic mesh bag.

Craddock admitted they were novice compared to a mama salmon, but they tried to place the eggs in the streambed gravel so they would have a maximum chance for survival.

The bags are recovered at intervals during the winter and the eggs checked to learn if any are being killed by such environmental factors as siltation. The eggs are hatching now in the Okanogan. Cooler waters make for a later hatching date in the other waters.

Cold Hinders Work

Meanwhile, back on the snowshoes, Arp has driven across Stevens Pass to the Wenatchee River. He has fastened the snowshoes and stomped his way for a mile and a half to the site of the egg plant.

Anchor ice has formed on the river bottom and the bag cords are frozen. Arp's hands are cold as he examines the eggs and finds 91 per cent of them alive and well.

Shivering as he starts the backward trip toward a lower and warmer altitude, Arp thinks it must be a right cold day back in his native Minnesota.
