INTERNATIONALLY KNOWN

Hungarian Pianist Will Preform Tonight

The internationally renowned pianist and Angel Records artist, Geza Anda, will appear in the third Civic Music Association concert of the season at 8 p.m. at McArthur Court.

The virtuoso's program for his Eugene performance will include Beethoven's Moonlight Sonata, Robert Schumann's Etudes en forme de Variations, Opus 13, Chopin's Ballade in G Minor and Franz Liszt's La Campanella and Concert Study in D-flat Major.

Through his many recordings, Anda was well known in this country before he ever made his debut. His first United States debut was made during the 1956-1957 concert season. His recitals and performances with the nation's major symphony orchestras have drawn nationwide praise from music critics.

Appeared in Philadelphia

During his first concert tour in this country, he appeared with the Philadelphia Symphony Orchestra in Philadelphia, New York, Washington, D. C., Baltimore and at the Worcester Festival. He also appeared with the symphony orchestras of San Francisco, Chicago, Cleveland, Minneapolis and Vancouver B. C.

The following season, his second tour included engagements with the San Francisco and Chicago symphonies. Anda also performed with the New York Philharmonic Symphony, and orchestras in St. Louis, Pittsburgh and Montreal.

Born in Hungary

Pianist Anda was born the son of musical parents in the Hungarian capital on the Danube river in 1921. Although his parents were not anxious for him to pursue a career in music, he entered the Royal Academy of Music at the age of thirteen.

Studying at the Academy for six years, Anda was a pupil of Ernst von Dohnanyi, a composer and pianist, for two years.

The young keyboard virtuoso won the Franz Liszt Prize, which was awarded every three years to the best pianist in Hungary.

Made Debut at 14

At the age of nineteen he made his debut in Budapest. He then left Hungary with a state scholarship for musical study in Berlin. During the war he gained a Swiss "Geneva Passport," and traveled unmolested throughout Europe.

A naturalized Swiss citizen after the war, he became increasingly popular in the music world throughout Europe. In 1951 he appeared for the first time at the world-famous Salzburg Festival. Since then he has made appearances at every festival.

CONTINUED THREAT

Inflation Problems Viewed by Lecturer

Basic economics of the problems of inflation in the nation's economy were discussed by C. Ward Macy Wednesday night in a Browsing Room lecture.

"We have an inflation-recession in our hands," Macy, head of the University department of economics, explained.

"Inflation will continue to be a threat to our economic stability for some time. But there is little cause for alarm in the current slump," Macy continued.

Downward Pull Noted

The current situation is one of high prices and high unemployment, the economist said. Prices have not yet responded to the downward pull.

Macy did not feel that a major recession was inevitable, but that the current situation was slight recession.

"In view of current government policies, continued inflation is not only possible but probable in coming years," he said.

Reserve Checks Discussed

Government and Federal Reserve System checks and releases on the economy were discussed, and Macy explained that the effect of continued high spending, especially in the field of defense, would tend to be an inflationary influence.

"The view that creeping inflation is necessary to economic growth should be exploded," Macy continued.

"A grave danger of gradual inflation is false security of well-being," he said, in noting the oppositions to inflation.

Has Leave of Absence

Macy currently has a leave of absence from the University for winter and spring terms to conduct a comparative research project on the tax system of Oregon, Washington, and California.

The project is sponsored by a Ford Foundation grant.

Another near-capacity crowd attended the lecture, fourth in the term's series. Discussion leader for the speech was R. M. Davis, associate professor of economics.

German professor. It combines the elements of a thriller, a psychological drama, a realistic play, and adds a touch of science fiction.

Vincenz Panny will play the major role as the German doctor in the probing drama. Panny is probably best remembered for his part as the doctor in "Doctor in Spite of Himself," another UT arena production.

Other members of the cast are: Gordon Bussey, who played Eben in last year's "Desire Under the Elms"; Sandra Pearson, who portrayed Mrs. Bayliss in the production of "All My Sons"; David Griffith and Diana Trevor both newcomers to the university; and Bob Klenke.

The play has scheduled performances for Feb. 4-15 in addition to the Friday and Saturday dates.
