

Beavers Favored in Weekend Tilt

Franklin, Gambia Vie In Chancellor Contest

Oregon State's basketball Beavers come to McArthur Court this Friday for the second game in the Chancellor Trophy series against Steve Belko's Oregon Webfoots.

The Ducks will be underdogs. Comparative records show that the Beavers have won 12 of 15 outings while Oregon has nine victories in 14 tries. In a season-opening contest, OSC tripped the Webfoots in a tight 60-55 contest.

In Pacific Coast Conference play the Beavers have been one

but Oregon has been improving of late and for this traditional battle all records must be put aside.

The Beavers, of course, place most of their hope on big 6-7 forward Dave Gambia. Gambia has averaged nearly 17 points per game and is one of the conference's leading rebounders.

Oregon will counter on the scoring chore with forward Charlie Franklin who actually rates higher than Gambia in PCC scoring and on the rebounding chore with center Hal Duffy.

Two other players to watch on the squads are Oregon guard Chuck Rask and Oregon State forward Ken Nanson.

Rask has been the sophomore playmaker on this year's squad and has also averaged better than 10 points per game. Nanson is one of the most improved players in the PCC—he's averaged about 14 points a game.

Oddly, the Beavers are a full game behind conference leading teams, California and UCLA, although they dealt the two southern schools their only PCC defeats of the season.

Duck Tracks

There's time, for just a moment, to look back into the year of 1957 and see the excellent accomplishments of athletics on the University Campus. Of course, one story cannot be included because it happened on the first day of 1958. That, of course, was when Oregon's football team lost the Rose Bowl game to Ohio State 10-7, but the final tally of sentiments after that game read something like this: Oregon 98,000, Ohio State 0. Let's turn back the clock and look at the top 10 sports stories of 1957:

1. Monday, November 25—Oregon's Webfoot football team received their official bid to represent the Pacific Coast Conference in the Rose Bowl game at 10:51 today. At 10:58 the Student Union chimes rang out with "Mighty Oregon" and 2500 persons headed for McArthur Court to give Len Casanova's gridders a cheering rally. Oregon will meet Ohio State at the Pasadena Rose Bowl on New Years Day.

2. Saturday, May 18—Bill Bowerman's powerful Oregon track team finished second in the annual Pacific Coast Conference track and field championships at Hayward Field today. The Ducks ended a long Southern California-UCLA dominance in the meet by scoring 39½ points to defending champion UCLA's 38. USC won the meet with 67 points. Webfoot pole vaulters Sam Whitney and Jack Burg clinched the runner-up position for Oregon on the last event of the day by tying for second place in the event with 14-4 leaps, the best jumps in both of their careers.

Gridders Edge Stanford

3. Saturday, November 2—The same desire which pushed Oregon's Webfoot gridders into the top position in the Pacific Coast Conference standings worked again today to absolute perfection as Len Casanova's Ducks held off a furious Stanford rally in the closing seconds of the game to win 27-26 before 56,000 stunned fans at Stanford Stadium. More than 1000 Oregon fans saw the Ducks hold Stanford for four downs on the UO nine-yard line in the waning moments of the game to clinch for the Webfoots their fifth straight PCC triumph.

4. Saturday, October 19—Oregon's rising football team moved into Rose Bowl contention today by defeating Washington State in a heart-stopping 14-3 thriller at Pullman. The Ducks built up a 14-0 lead into the fourth quarter but it took a stray conversion attempt by WSC quarterback Bobby Newman in the final minute of play to give Oregon its third straight Pacific Coast Conference victory of the season.

5. Saturday, May 11—Oregon's best-ever track team made a runaway out of the Northern Division track and field

UO Basketbatters Host Indian Team This Monday Night

Following Friday night's Oregon State clash, Oregon's Webfoot hoopers return to action Monday night when they host Stanford's Indians at McArthur Court. Stanford will meet Oregon State at Corvallis Saturday night.

Stanford is one of the PCC's weaker teams but despite a 6-9 season record, the Indians have defeated USF for one of the big upsets of the hoop season.

Forward John Arrillaga, center Dick Haga, and guard Paul Neumann have been consistent starters but the other two men have varied from game to game. Forward Chris Burford and guard Mike Tipton will most likely be in the lineup for the opening tip-off Monday.

Arrillaga, Burford and Tipton are sophomores and the lack of experience has shown a great deal.

Although the team is not scoring as well as Coach Howie Dallmar would like, and is not as solid on defense as it needs to be, the Indian quintet is capable of coming up with a top effort anytime.

This is an interesting, hustling team, similar to Oregon's, which battles all the way and puts on a good show.

Stanford's biggest scoring threat will come from Neumann and Arrillaga who have averaged 13.2 and 11.7 in all of the Indians' games this season.

Stanford biggest strength: in the free throw department where the squad has connected on .721 of its attempts.

Jerry Anderson, alternating guard and forward on this year's Oregon basketball team, is the brother of Max Anderson, former all-Northern Division center for the Ducks.
