

Oregon Schools Seek Research Projects

PORTLAND (AP)—A committee to seek more federal government research projects for Oregon colleges will be named by John Richards, state chancellor of higher education.

At present, he said Tuesday, most research projects are received by the medical and dental schools, the University of Oregon,

and Oregon State Colleges.

Richards said that within 10 years, some research projects should be going to smaller state-supported and private colleges.

He told the Board of Higher Education that government research programs now have serious "imbalances," with too many colleges getting too small a share of projects.

Labs Criticized

Government and military laboratories where scientists are hampered too much by security measures also were criticized by Richards.

John Swarthout was appointed the new dean of faculty at Portland State College. He has been head of the Oregon State College political science department.

Calling of bids on the third unit of a new University of Oregon women's dormitory was put off until the board's March meeting, but the final plans were approved.

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Ike's Economic Report Called 'Wishful Array'

WASHINGTON (AP)—An AFL-CIO official said Wednesday President Eisenhower's economic report "unfolds an array of wishful thinking with implications of dangerous political deception."

But a spokesman for the U. S. Chamber of Commerce supported Eisenhower's view that a business upturn is likely by the last half of 1958, saying the current slump apparently "will be fairly mild and short-lived."

Opposition Given

The opposing views came from Stanley H. Ruttenberg, research director for the Labor Federation, and Walter D. Fackler, assistant director of economic research for the U. S. chamber.

Their statements were prepared for the joint congressional economic committee which is holding hearings on the President's economic report. Eisenhower submitted the report on Jan. 20, as required by law, to detail current and anticipated economic conditions.

Estimates Criticized

Ruttenberg criticized Eisenhower's estimates, saying:

"At a time when the nation's problems require honest reporting and hardheaded solutions, the prospect of next November's returns seem to have directed the administration to lull the American people with soothing optimism."

Fackler said present indications are that defense spending will eliminate the need to step up other government programs as an aid to economic readjustment.
