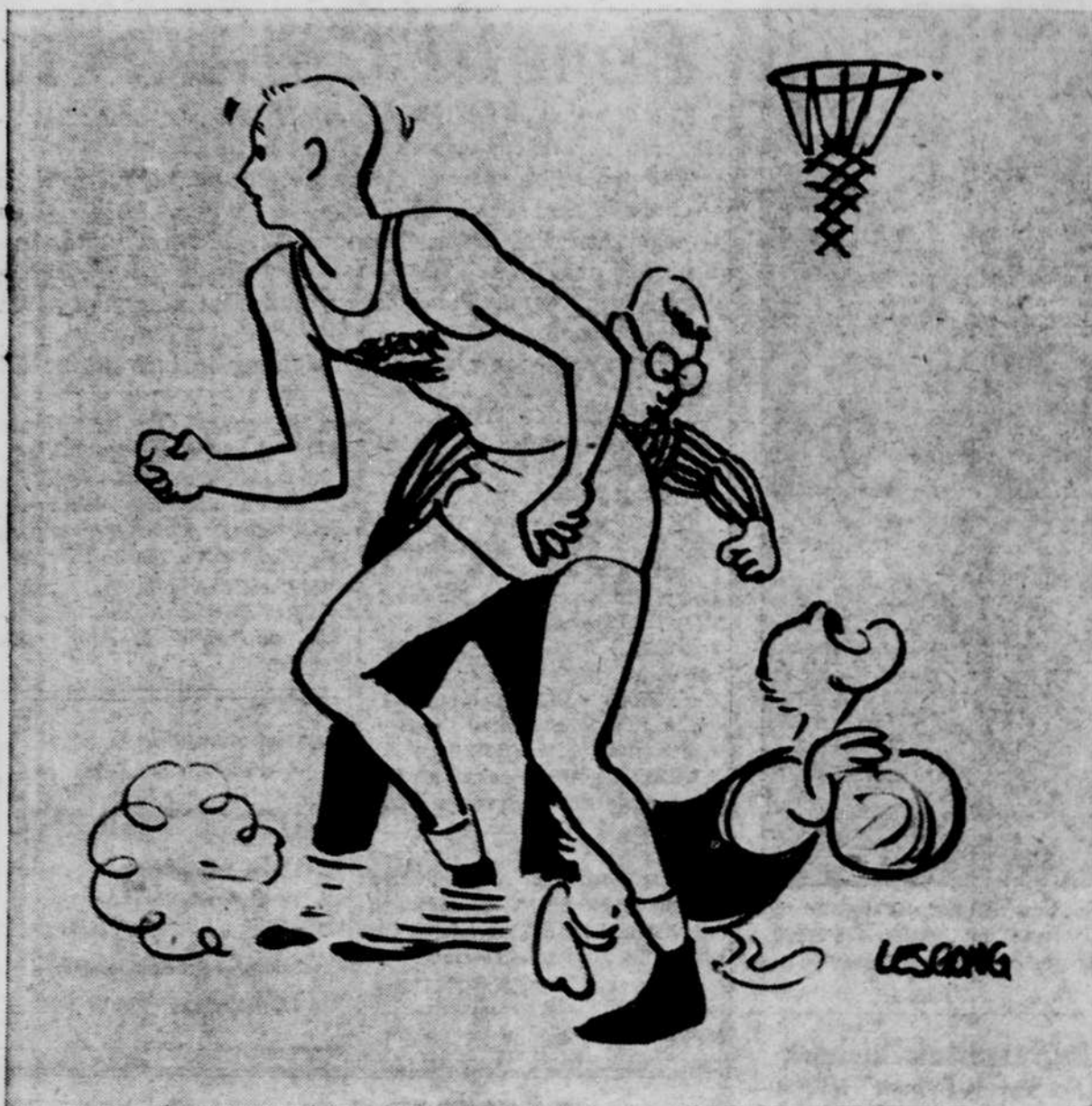


'Civil War' Resumes Tonight



Frosh, Rooks Vie In Prelim Tussle

Oregon's Frosh cagers seek to avenge defeat tonight when they host the Oregon State College Rooks at 6 p.m. in McArthur Court in the second of four "Little Civil War" contests.

The Aggie five clipped the Ducklings, 58-56, last Friday at Corvallis in the initial 1958 meeting of the two teams. The contest was a thriller all the way, with the Rooks winning it on a pair of free throws after the final buzzer.

The game, the preliminary to the varsity Duck-Beaver clash at 8 p.m., should see an improved Oregon team at the free throw line. Inability to hit from the charity mark cost the Ducklings last Friday's contest, and consequently they have been drilling hard on the problem all week.

Oregon will enter the contest sporting a 6-2 won-lost mark for the current season.

The Rooks will lay on the line a two-in-a-row win skein, and will be trying for three with a victory tonight.

On paper, the Rooks should be slight favorites. They have a distinct height advantage in 6'9" center Karl Anderson and 6'5" forward Steve Flynn, whose accuracy at the foul line brought victory to the Rooks last Friday.

OSC is a good-shooting, polished ball club, and possesses a five-game scoring average of 61 points per game as opposed to 54 per centest for their opponents.

By the same token, the Frosh also have a top team, with the ability to rebound, shoot and play tight defense. In addition, the Frosh have an eight-game scoring average of a bountiful 74 points per game, while holding opponents to a tight 56.4.

Oregon State fives seem to have rough times when not playing in the confines of Gill

Coliseum, but this fact can be tossed out the window inasmuch as in a meeting of two arch-rivals anything can happen.

Don Kirsch, Duckling head mentor, will not be with his squad tonight, since he will be scouting the Washington-Stanford game at Seattle. Assistant coach Bruce McIntosh will handle the Ducklings in Kirsch's absence.

Mac named a tentative starting five which included Butch Kimpton and Leon Hayes at guards, Pudgy Hunt at center, and Denny Strickland and Tim Hindman at forwards. Center Ron Anderson and guard Sheldon Berg are also expected to see considerable action, the coach said.

OSC boss Paul Valenti will probably start Roger Johnson and Mike Carson at guards, Karl Anderson at center, and Steve Flynn and Ernie Johnson at forwards.

Further action for the two squads finds the Rooks hosting University of Portland's junior varsity tomorrow night at 6 p.m., and the Frosh holding open-house in McArthur Court for Hennen & Vos' AAU five on Monday at 6 p.m.

Oregon, OSC Seek Victory In McArthur Court Contest

It's "Civil War" time at McArthur Court tonight as Oregon's improving Webfoot hoopers host Oregon State's strong Beavers in the second of their annual Chancellor Trophy contests. Game time is at 8:00 p.m.

Steve Belko's crew will be looking for its third Pacific Coast Conference victory of the season, but can expect some stiffer resistance from Slat's Gills Beavers tonight.

OSC, winners of four PCC games in six tries, have chalked up victories over California and UCLA, current leaders in the conference race and are only one game off the league-leading pace. Both clubs boast winning records over the season route. The Ducks have a 9-5 record compared to the 12-3 mark of the Beavers.

The Chancellor Trophy, which has gone to OSC ever since it was inaugurated in 1953, is awarded to the school which wins the best-of-three series between Oregon and Oregon State. Gill's hoopers won a season-opening 60-55 decision at McArthur Court last December and thus need only to win tonight's game to retain the trophy.

PCC statistics give Oregon State a decided edge in tonight's game. Records of the two teams in six conference games:

In most of these figures, Oregon holds the "quantity" edge, but OSC leads in average.

But the Ducks with their sophomore-studded squad is improving as the season progresses. In their last three PCC outings they've defeated Washington and Washington State while dropping a close one to Idaho.

Oregon State, on the other hand, has recently lost two PCC games to California and Washington. This trend could lead to a close exciting battle tonight.

Belko will probably go with the same starting lineup as in the past with Charlie Franklin and Dale Herron at forwards, Hal Duffy at center, and Bud Kuykendall at guards.

Franklin leads the Webfoot scorers and scored 35 points against Idaho last weekend. Herron is the most improved player on the squad according to Belko. Duffy will be counted on heavily

for the rebounding chore against the Beavers tonight.

Rask is the playmaker on the squad and has proved as a sophomore that he has an outstanding career ahead of him. Kuykendall is counted on heavily as Oregon's chief outside-shooting threat.

Gill, like Belko, plans no changes in OSC's starting lineup and will go with forwards Dave Gambee and Ken Nanson, center Gary Goble, and guards Lee Harmon and Jim Anderson.

An interesting scoring dual between Franklin and Gambee is expected. The two forwards have 17.0 and 16.5 averages respectively and both recently broke career scoring records at their respective schools.

Monday the Webfoots host another PCC team in Stanford. The Indians are by no means the strongest club in the conference but proved they can be tough on a given night with a victory over the University of San Francisco earlier this season.
