

Venn 'On Right Track' Says DA Candidate

District Attorney Eugene Venn is on the right track in his agreement with magazine distributors, DA candidate William Frye said Wednesday. Frye spoke to an over-flow audience at a coffee hour sponsored by Sigma Delta Chi, professional journalism fraternity.

Frye's topic was "The District Attorney's Actions in Light of the 1st and 14th Amendments." He criticized Venn's initial method of ridding Lane County's newsstands of "trash" by ordering individual dealers to take the magazines off their stands.

Oregon Graduate

Frye, a graduate of Oregon's Journalism and Law Schools and now associated with a Eugene law firm, said that Venn's action came too close to bypassing the legislation set up to deal with lewd and indecent publications. In deciding to make an informal agreement with the three distributors who control all of the county's magazines, Frye said, that Venn is dealing with the problem in a "sensible" manner.

Prosecution Not Worthwhile

Attempting to prosecute the magazine dealers would not be worthwhile, Frye said, in light of the changing content of the magazines and the constant flux in jury membership.

Frye granted that the present law and system of enforcement are the best possible, but he listed some dangers:

- The jury system is by-passed.
- The people have no information on what is being banned.
- There is no guarantee that what is banned is any more offensive than literature which escapes censure.

Science Tours On Program For Weekend

Skull and Dagger, sophomore men's honorary, will guide tours to the schools and departments on campus Saturday morning as a special feature of the 1958 Dads' Weekend.

Tours will leave the registration tables in the Student Union at 9:15. The tours will visit the departments located in the following buildings:

Commonwealth, Allen, Friendly, Condon, Chapman, Fenton, Villard, Deady, the Education building, Lawrence, and the Science building.

Immediately after the science lecture to be given by Ray Ellickson, physics dept head in 123 Science Building the Kwamas will guide tours to the same departments.
