

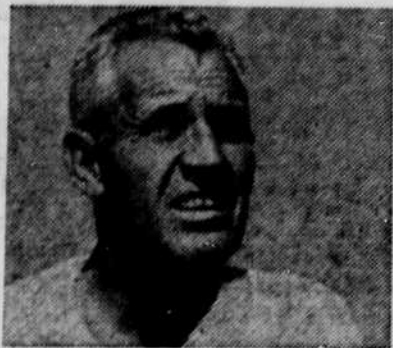
Cas, Prothro Tie For Coach Honors

Oregon football coach Len Casanova was voted the state's outstanding coach of the year along with Oregon State's grid mentor Tommy Prothro Thursday night at the tenth annual Bill Hayward Banquet of Champions at Portland's Columbia Athletic Club.

The Webfoot coach, who piloted his 1957 grid squad to Pasadena Rose Bowl fame, and Prothro, who guided his Beavers team to a co-PCC championship with Oregon, deadlocked in the final secret ballot of the 50 judges.

OSC tailback Joe Francis won the "man of the year" award for his sterling gridiron play for the Beavers in 1957.

Last year University of Oregon miler Jim Bailey won the award

for running the first mile under four minutes on American soil.

Casanova's footballers marched to the co-PCC title; then battled the nation's number one team, Ohio State yard-for-yard before dropping a tight 10-7 decision.

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Matmen Slate OSC Saturday

Oregon's strong wrestling team, winner of its first six matches but loser in its last outing against always-powerful OSC, will seek to get back on the win trail Saturday at McArthur Court when it meets Washington State in a return match.

A test between the Frosh and Hudson Bay high school of Vancouver, Wash. will precede the varsity go at 1 p.m., and the Duck-WSC clash is slated to get underway at 2:30.

Oregon easily whipped the Cougars when the two clubs met earlier in the season in Pullman, but the match could be closer this time.

Coach Bill Hammer appeared worried in practice Thursday about the condition of his squad. Hammer said that two starters will probably miss the meet against a good WSC team.

The two injured grapplers are 147-pound Jay Dearing and undefeated 177-pounder, Dave Fish. It is possible that one or even both of them will be ready to go Saturday, so that Hammer was still undecided about his starting

line-up.

Hammer said that sure starters would be Gary Parks, 123, Ron Conner, 130; Ken Karnes, 137; and Howard Timmons, 147.

Dearing will wrestle in the 157-pound division if he is able, otherwise it will be junior Jim Beaton. Captain George Krupicka is set in the 167 bracket.

Fish normally goes in the 177-pound class, but if he is unable to go, Dearing is well, then the versatile Beaton will wrestle 20 pounds over his weight in the 177 division. If neither Dearing or Fish is healthy, then junior Bob Curtis will take over in this class.

The heavyweight choice is no problem with two-year letterman J. C. Wheeler ready in that spot.

Thursday the Ducks went through their last hard drill before the meet, working on take down and escapes.

The Frosh, like the varsity once-beaten and ready to start a new victory streak, have announced their starting team.

Oregon Skiers Ready For Winter Carnival

The University of Oregon Ski team travels to Mt. Hood this weekend for the second annual Winter Carnival. After several dual meets at neighboring ski areas, the team is looking forward to its first big race of the season.

Defending champion, Oregon State, is again rated as the top team in the Carnival, and will provide stiff competition for the Oregon team. The greatest problem Oregon will face, is the fact that Oregon State's team is composed of several class A racers, while the Ducks will have to depend on their B and C classifications to carry them through. If all three classes are run together, which is likely to happen,

Duck Tracks

It's not very often that three winning teams from one school slate action all in one day at the same place. That's the situation at McArthur Court Saturday. Dads and their sons will have the opportunity to watch the Webfoots' varsity and freshman wrestling teams and the varsity basketball squad and all three teams have records with more wins than losses. In fact, the combined record of all three UO teams involved is 22 wins and 8 defeats—a real accomplishment in any league.

The action-packed day kicks off at 1:00 p.m. when the freshman wrestlers meet Ft. Vancouver High. The Ducklings will carry a 7-1 or 6-2 record into the match depending on the outcome of tonight's match at Eugene High. The Frosh's only loss came last weekend when Oregon State's Rooks won a narrow two-point margin despite losing more matches than they won.

The varsity matmen, like the Frosh, had a six-match undefeated record until running into Oregon State, but Bill Hammer's crew will try to get back on the winning trail with Saturday's match against Washington State, starting at 2:30 p.m. The varsity met and defeated the Cougars in an earlier match at Pullman 20-8, but WSC, strong in the light-weight divisions, should be tougher in this outing. The Cougars came very close to upsetting defending champion OSC a few weeks ago.

Grapplers Put on Good Show

To those who have never watched college wrestling, go up to Mac Court Saturday afternoon and watch some real tests of physical stamina, balance and coordination. The referee awards points as each match progresses for take-downs, reversals, escapes and near falls. If there is no fall, the individual that has piled up the most points wins the decision. Three team points go to the club that wins a match by decision; five points go to the squad that wins a match by a fall or by forfeit.

Saturday evening at 8:30 p.m. Steve Belko's varsity basketballers meet Idaho in a key Pacific Coast Conference basketball clash. The Webfoot hoopers have come a long way since 1957's last place finisher in the PCC race. Belko's club this year has no less than six sophomores on the abbreviated 12-man squad.

Two of these sophomores are due to start Saturday night Guard Chuck Rask is a cinch starter, while either sophomores Dale Herron or Stu Robertson will open at one of the forward positions. Forward Charlie Franklin, center Hal Duffy and guard Bud Kuykendall are slated for the opening tipoff at the other positions. This club has won 10 of 16 games this season, and although the Ducks have won only three of eight conference games, they are improving with every contest.

Varsity, Frosh Slate Corvallis Action

Oregon faces a stiff test tonight against Oregon State at Corvallis as well as Saturday night's Idaho contest. The Beavers have won twice against the Webfoots already this season and hope to improve their fourth place PCC standing with another victory. A fourth winning Oregon team, Don Kirsch's Duckling cagers, will meet OSC's Rooks in preliminary action at Corvallis at 6:30 p.m. This club has won eight of 10 games this year after the 1957 club went through 15 games without a loss. These top Duckling squads mean an even-better varsity five in the future.

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
