Churches to Observe

Churches throughout America will be observing Race Relations Sunday this week. On this campus, several groups will be meeting to see a special film on this topic.

At Wesley Foundation Sunday evening, 5:30 p.m., students from Christian House, Westminster House, and Wesley Foundation will have a union meeting, the first this term. "Broken Mask," a color film on the theme "Christ, the Church, and Race" will be shown and will be discussed in buzz groups immediately afterwards.

This film develops around the story of two young men, college students, one a Negro and one a white boy. As their friendship grows, it must overcome many obstacles. One of these is in the church. "Broken Mask" tells a forceful story about the masks of prejudice.

Film Dialogue

From the film: "White mask... black skin... black mask on white skin... The color of a man... separates us from the man himself... We let color compromise our faith! Yet... Christ... was God in man... God Himself in human flesh... black flesh?... brown flesh?... white flesh?"

RE Theme Is Topic

Immediately following the merger meeting the representatives of University Religious Council, Religious Directors' Association, and the faculty Spiritual Life Committee, as well as Religious Emphasis Week leaders, will meet to select the theme for next year's RE Week.

Sunday morning at Westminster House will be continued discussion on the topic, "Is There More Than one Jesus in the New Testament?" Presbyterian students are invited to bring their Dads to the house this week-end.

group will make critical use of State Department publications in open discussion about such things as "Security and the Rocket Age" and "Should We Trade with Red China?"

Fadeley Clarifies Racial Charges

Edward N. Fadeley, candidate for District Attorney and graduate last year of the law school, made clear Thursday charges he had made earlier against the University administration's racial policies.

Fadeley, who spoke Tuesday night in the Student Union before the Young Democrats, said he

did not mean in his talk to criticize admissions or application of academic policies in relation to racial restriction.

He did, however, criticize the administration's housing policy because, in effect, he said, the University has given financial support and recognition to living groups that maintain racial clauses in their constitutions.
