

'Y' Representatives Interview Today For Foreign Project and Study Posts

Representatives of three groups interested in student exchange and international understanding will be on campus this month to explain their programs and interview students for the projects.

Robert Carlson, program chairman of the American Friends Service Committee in Oregon, will be on campus today and Wednesday to interview students for AFSC projects.

The AFSC sponsors a number of projects and seminars, both in the U.S. and abroad. In the past years Oregon students have participated in work camp projects in Europe and Mexico, in the "internes in industry" program in industrial cities of the U.S., in international seminars, and in weekend work campus.

Katherine Thanas, a representative of the Council on Student

Travel, will visit the University Feb. 17 to discuss projects and tours sponsored by this group. Included in programs sponsored by the council is a student exchange program with the U.S.S.R. planned for this summer.

Approximately forty students from America will participate in the program. Ten of them will be selected by the national student councils of the YMCA and YWCA. Other organizations will select the remaining representatives.

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by virtue of its previous existence. The recognition of problems and their solution by the groups immediately involved is the only reasonable path, dissolution or blind adherence to tradition solves nothing.

And there is good evidence that there is something being done by the Greek system. It's no longer possible to speak of all fraternities as being discriminatory, just as it's equally misinformed to speak of them as purely anti-intellectual. (Unfortunately, it's much more difficult to defend sororities on the former count; there is much more of the "snob" in them.)

Outside pressure is justified and helpful only in as much as it helps the system in recognizing its weaknesses and combating them; it is neither justified nor helpful in calling for its abolition.

Pershing Rifles Win 'Drill-Off'

Oregon's company of Pershing Rifles, national military honorary, won first place in drill competition with five other schools at Corvallis Saturday.

The local organization, which also serves as the army ROTC drill team, is captained by senior Hoyt Martin.

Other schools represented by Pershing Rifles units at the Corvallis "drill-off" were Oregon State, Washington State, the University of Washington, Montana and Idaho State College.

The six participants make up the active membership of the 11th regiment of Pershing Rifles, which has headquarters in Corvallis. This was the first annual drill competition between the units.



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
