To say that the University is a "Country Club" is even more folly. Are the following points the nucleus of a "Country Club": one o'clock closing hours on weekends; a dry zone, and lack of alcoholic consumption in fraternities; no weekend "retreats" between fraternities and sororities; strict enforcement of lesser rules for women, i.e., regulative clothing on campus, demerits, study tables, phone duty, permission to go home on weekends, etc.; and a very brief period during spring term conducive to outdoor "beer busts." There are many schools in the country whose social orders are far more liberal than ours, yet they do not have the audacity to regard themselves as "Country Clubs." It is an insurmountable precipice from the Sahara Club to the Top of the Mark in San Francisco, and even a greater retrogression to our "rural social activities."

It is evident that the University is in a state of marginal existence, being enlightened neither academically nor socially. Our personal desire is to see students take a major stride in either direction, thus elevating themselves from their present social and academic immobility. Vive la indifference?
