Prof Is Guest Here; Prepares for Study

Professor Gordon Miller of the University of Utah has been the guest of the Bureau of Business Research this week in preparation for a study which he will make similar to one now being conducted by the Bureau here.

The Oregon study concerns itself with "non-user benefits" of highways, such as the benefit of public utility poles and underground cables. It is sponsored jointly by the Federal Bureau of Public Roads and the Oregon State Highway Dept.

The results of the Bureau's study are slated for publication this summer. W. C. Ballaine, professor of business administration and director of the Bureau of Business Research, is chairman of the study. He is assisted by D. A. Watson, assistant professor of business administration, and H. T. Koplin, assistant professor of economics.
