

Eugene Gets Slight Trace Of Hail Mixed with Rain

A spattering of hail mixed with rain fell in Eugene Wednesday, according to Weather Bureau reports.

Some of western Oregon's lowlands got their first trace of snow Wednesday when a cold front moved southward through the state.

The storm, expected to pass into California today, left flecks of snow in Portland's West Hills and measurable amounts in high mountain areas, according to the Weather Bureau.

Sleet mixed with rain fell at Astoria during a thunderstorm.

Low temperatures of about 32

are expected in Oregon today, the bureau said. Wednesday's low for the state was 28 degrees, reported at both Lakeview and Burns.

Each sophomore would continue to serve through his and her junior and senior years. The ASUO Senate would pass on the recommendation of the cabinet and the deans, in selection of members.

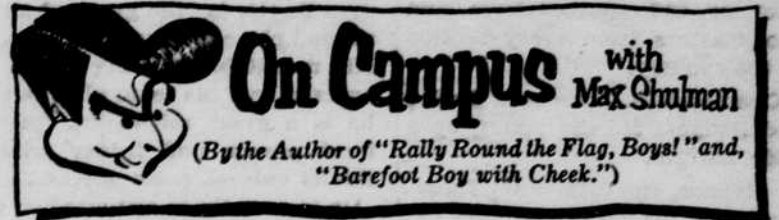
Alternates, either men or women, would be chosen for each class and would serve when either five members were not present or when one of the regulars becomes inactive.
