"Shape up or ship out," snapped Mrs. Golda P. Wickham, dean of women, to presidents of women's living organizations at an extraordinary Monday night meeting of Heads of Houses.

"If you don't like the way we run things here, you can get out right now," Mrs. Wickham fumed when one sorority president questioned the severity of the new code of women's standards which the dean revealed at the meeting. The new code, which covered 17 typed pages, caused lifted eyebrows and murmurs of confusion when mimeographed copies were distributed at the meeting.

'Just a Suggestion'

"This is merely a suggestion of possible approaches to re-evaluation of present systems of women's standards," said Mrs. Wickham, hefting the document. "It would provide a convenient standardization of standard," she explained.

The dean's suggestion that a motion to accept the suggested code would be in order was at first received with coolness by the group. "If you won't play ball, I'll be forced to disband this organization and appoint a more responsible group to rubber-stamp these proposals," Mrs. Wickham said heatedly. "I sincerely want to keep the system of self-discipline on a voluntary basis," she added.

The new code which was accepted unanimously at the end

of the 15-minute meeting included the following points:

- Closing hours will be 4:45 p.m. in order to give coeds time to freshen up for dinner. Library privileges will be granted three nights each week from 6 to 9:30 p.m. with sign-in at the library compulsory. Women may go to and from the library after sundown only in groups of three or more, accompanied by a chaperon.

Men off Limits

- Men will not be allowed within one block of any women's living organization at any time of day, and are expressly forbidden to attend women's house dances.

- Women on dates are not permitted to loosen safety belts in any automobile operated by a male.

- Women must wear Mother Hubbards or flowing car coats at all times on campus and must dress in "proper taste" when traveling to and from home (on any pretense).

- Sitting within a coffee-cup length in the Student Union fish-bowl is prohibited, and mixed committee meetings may not be held behind closed or open doors.

- During dessert exchanges, women are not allowed to touch male partners during dances.

- Front porches of sororities and dormitories must be abolished.

- "Pleasures of the flesh" are strongly discouraged.

The rules, stressed Mrs. Wickham, are to go into effect "immediately, if not sooner," and are to last "forever, if not longer."
