Saving Passion Nets Reward--- Jail Sentence

PORTLAND (AP) — A passion for saving has earned a jail sentence for a 71-year-old Milwaukee, Ore., resident.

Leo Fontana saved a yardful of scrap lumber, estimated at 100 truckloads, plus scrap metal, newspapers, three old autos and 21 stray dogs.

Last fall neighbors began complaining about the dogs and the debris. Fontana ignored a circuit court order to clean up his yard and license his dogs. Now he is serving a 90-day sentence for contempt of court.

A cleanup crew is hauling away Fontana's scrap. They estimate it will take 10 days to complete the job.

1958 Car Turnout Suffers Big Drop

Auto production by the Big Three dropped by 614,666 units in the first quarter of this year in comparison with the corresponding period of 1957.

G.M. output declined from 999,820 to 838,068, Ford from 628,938 to 397,605, and Chrysler from 302,604 to 171,032.

General Motors, Ford and Chrysler turned out 1,406,695 vehicles in 1958's first three months, compared to 2,021,361 in last year's like period. Included were figures for cars, trucks and coaches.

Production figures released by the firms Tuesday showed March production was off sharply from March, 1957. Ford's Thunderbird line was the only model of the Big Three which showed a gain in March and in 1958's first quarter.
