

Neuberger Acknowledges His Breach with Morse

PORTLAND (AP)—Sen. Neuberger (D-Ore)—30 pounds lighter because of a rigorous work schedule and a careful diet—returned to his Portland home for the Congressional Easter recess.

He told reporters at a press conference that he had been threatened with political reprisal by members of the Democratic Party, whom he did not name, because of his voting record.

That doesn't hit him at all, the senator said. "I'll bet on the good judgment of the people of the state of Oregon."

Left or Right?

He acknowledged that the breach between him and Sen. Morse (D-Ore), was widening on the basis of issue. But Neuberger said he has a "great personal admiration and personal fondness" for the senior senator. And anyway, he added, "it isn't a bad

thing to have a right handed pitcher and a left handed catcher on the team." Neuberger did not say whether he saw himself as the catcher or the pitcher.

He had this to say on other topics:

"I don't know whether I'll be a candidate for re-election." But he said neither he nor his wife, Maurine Neuberger, like Washington and he found his duties as a senator "the hardest work I've ever done."

He said he believes in fiscal responsibility and that "sincerity is subject to suspicion" when a

congressman sponsors bills for a multitude of federal projects and then demands tax cuts."

Oregon: Tin Cup State

Oregon, he said, has gained the reputation of a begging "tin cup state" because of demands for federal projects, including dams, harbor works, river channel dredging, forest highways and access roads and others.

He said he has been accused of turning his back on liberalism. "You can be liberal and you can be responsible," he said. "I don't think I've become a reactionary."

On the subject of a postal rate increase, he said he could have been accused of hypocrisy if he had voted for a pay increase for postal employees without voting for an increase in postal rates to finance it.

Supports Ike on Trade

Neuberger said he intends to support the Eisenhower administration on extension of reciprocal trade and to continue support of foreign aid.

And he said also he does not go along with criticism of Agriculture Secretary Benson. "Democrats haven't offered any better solution" to the farm problem than Republicans, he said.

April Rain Continues

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to the professionals for a philosophy of education that might lead us out of this quagmire, we find here too that academic specialty, perhaps the worst of all, has sprung up. There never has been an output of nonsense comparable to that found in the books that proliferate from education departments.

They stress the totality of education, but they miss the boat. The totality they're seeking is not the whole of life, but the whole of serious thought. Along the way they might find more sense, and certainly less nonsense, in stressing what is common, related, and not tedious, rather than needless complexity and difference.

But the outlook for higher education isn't bright. The sociologist that the psychologist could understand would probably have little to say, and the economist might find that his schema need revising. Anyway, by the time the change comes we'll probably be cubby-holed and resist too.
