

Webfoots to Play Seven Games

Duck Baseballers Seek to Extend Winning Streak

Oregon's strong pitching staff gets a stiff test this week as the Webfoot baseballers meet seven opponents in five days. Don Kirsch's busy squad opens the week's action with a doubleheader today on Howe Field—game time is 1:30 p.m.

The Webfoots are currently riding on a five game winning streak which includes spring vacation victories over the defending national collegiate champion California Bears and Santa Clara.

Last weekend the Ducks dropped Willamette 7-1, and Lewis and Clark in a twin bill 7-1 and 3-0. Oregon pitchers allowed a total of only eight hits against three Northwest Conference foes.

Wednesday, the Ducks will meet Willamette in another Howe Field clash; then travel to Portland for a Thursday game with Portland University, a Friday game with Portland State and a Saturday doubleheader with Lewis and Clark.

Three rookie pitchers, Jim Fitzsimmons, Jack Loy and Hugh Springer, will probably see action in the three Howe Field games. This Webfoot threesome retired 27 consecutive batters in last Friday's Willamette contest.

Portland Beavers Travel Northward

BRAWLEY, Calif. (AP) — The Portland Beavers of the Pacific Coast League were on a slow trip homeward Monday with an 8-4 record for their spring baseball training season here.

Seven more games—including one at Klamath Falls as they enter Oregon—are scheduled before the April 15 opener against Sacramento at Portland.

The weather held the key to whether some of the games in the rainy California towns would be played, but this was the schedule as the Portland Club left here: Riverside, Monday; Bakersfield, Wednesday; Modesto, Thursday; Sacramento, Friday; Regging, Saturday and Klamath Falls, Sunday.

The first Oregon game—as was the last training camp game here—will be against the Vancouver Mounties. In Sunday's game here Portland won 13-6. A high wind took a hand and helped Portland to two homers and Vancouver to one.

Hurlers Jon England, Rolie Heath, Don Lane and Ron Whittaker will pitch in the Portland games if they're not needed for heavy duty in earlier games.

Lane and Whittaker have been chief chuckers for the Ducks for this season. Lane's performances have especially stood out. He's completed both games he started and in 18 innings of baseball, he has allowed only two runs and seven hits—including a one-hit shutout against Lewis and Clark Saturday.

Elsewhere in the lineup, Jim Galasso, Ed Grier and Dick Ruark continue to vie for third base position on the starting nine.

Lettermen George Simpson and Jerry Urness are still locked in a tight race with sophomore Dick Occhiuto and Larry Hughes for two open outfield spots.

The rest of the lineup will see returning Northern Division all-stars, second basemen Wimp Hastings and catcher Ellis Olson, first baseman Jim Rice, shortstop Jim Pipher and right fielder Len Read opening for the action.

Of the Webfoot opponents this week, Linfield, Willamette and Lewis and Clark are members of the Northwest Conference, Portland State belongs to the Oregon Collegiate Conference and Portland University is one of the tough independent teams in the area.

The Ducks will open their defense of the Northern Division championship they won last year on April 18 against Oregon State at Howe Field. The Beavers placed third last after chasing Oregon to the ND crown.

The Webfoots are hoping it doesn't rain today. Already this season, six games have been rained out, while only five have been played.

High Scores Dominate Opening Round Action
