Sing Rules Told

• The same song used in the eliminations must be sung in the final All-Campus Sing.

• A two point G.P.A. is not necessary for students participating in the Sing.

• Singers must be affiliated with the house and at the time of the Sing be in attendance at the University. No graduate students or professional musicians may sing with the group.

Eight Bar Maximum

• No more than eight consecutive bars of solo by any one voice may be used.

• Three copies of the music must be presented to the judges both at the elimination and at the Sing. The music does not need to be published copies, but it must be legible.

• The order of singing will be by drawing among among the men and women and not by alphabetical order.

• There will be a time limit of six minutes for each song.

• No sorority, fraternity, hall, or church hymns may be sung.

• No freshmen women may sing with their houses. If they are to sing, they must sing with their dormitories.

• Songs will be judged according to the following:

Tonal quality, which includes harmony, intonation and blend, will count 30 per cent in the judging. Interpretation, which includes audience appeal will count 20 per cent. Diction will count 20 per cent.

Musical arrangement, which will be judged on the basis of suitability for voices and general suitability of the song, will count 10 per cent in the judging.

Stage appearance and neatness will count for 10 per cent. Following the director will also count for 10 per cent.
