

# East Buries West In Pro Hoop Play

The "best in basketball" came to McArthur Court Friday night in the person of the National Basketball Association's East and West All-Stars, and when they left Mac Court later in the evening the 4737 fans on hand had truly seen basketball at its finest.

Paced by the not-so-famous 'Stars, the East came from behind to clobber the West, 132-111, but the final score was only incidental and not at all indicative of the caliber of the West team.

The West had won three of the four previous clashes between the divisional stars going into Friday's contest and looked like they were going to make it four of five when they leaped to an almost-20 point advantage with a little time left in the first of the four 12-minute periods.

Then the East, led by the rebounding of Dolph Schayes and Ken Sears, began to control the boards and rapidly chewed up the West lead to the point where the Dick Garmaker-paced Westerners held only a three-point margin at the end of the first period.

When the East moved out in front minutes later it was to stay, as their lead varied from 8 to 20 points during the rest of the contest.

There was little shooting deficiency on either club—every player was a near-deadeye, but the East's control of the boards earned them possession most of the time and led to the easy victory.

It would be difficult to single out any one player on either team for his brilliance, for every man was a top-notch

eager in his own right and played like one all the way. But little Bob Cousy, 6-1, but a tiny pro, of the East and Boston Celtics caught the fancy of the fans more than anyone else with his dazzling ball handling and trick shots.

Nine of the ten East players scored in double figures with Neil Johnson's 19 points the highest total. Seven Westerners sank 10 or more, with the Minneapolis Lakers' Garmaker taking honors with 28 markers.

Don Kirsch's baseballers will try to open the ND season again next weekend against Idaho on Howe Field, and will meet two non-conference foes during the week.

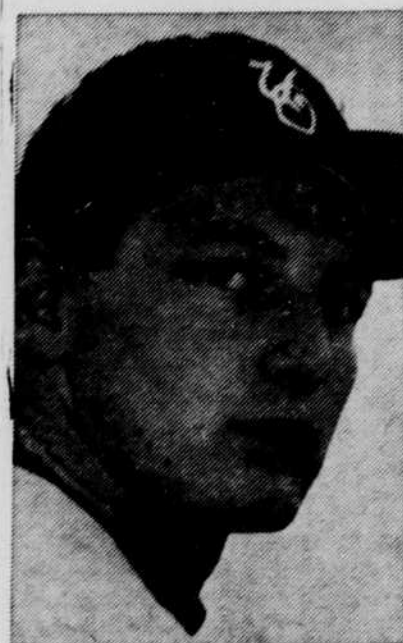
The Ducks meet the professional Eugene Emeralds of the Class B Northwest League here Tuesday; then face Pacific University on Wednesday—also on Howe Field.

The Ducks, winners of the division title last year, may find the competition stiffer this season with improved clubs at OSC and Washington State. Both clubs are stacked heavily with pitching.

# Webfoot Golfers Trounce Viking, OSC Divoteers

Sid Milligan's Oregon Webfoot golfers made it clear Friday that they're out to hang on to their perennial Northern Division championship, as they whipped the Oregon State Beavers, 21-6, at the Eugene Country Club.

Duck captain Bob Prall and letterman Gary Hval both captured one-under-par rounds of 71 to pace the Oregon onslaught.

Portland State fell victim to the Webfoots Saturday at ECC, with Prall again firing a 71 to spark the Ducks to a runaway 16-2 non-conference victory.

OSC was in the running in Friday's match until the end of the best-ball matches; then the roof fell in. Oregon came out on top in best-ball play, 5-2, with the Duck duo of Bob Norquist and Hval grabbing a three-point win, and the Webfoot pair of Prall and Chuck Siver earning a 1 1/2 point draw with an under-par 69 in the best match of the day.

Individual matches turned the tide against the Beavers, as OSC was flooded by a 16-2 Oregon victory.

In individual competition, Prall, Hval, Larry and Keith Gubrud, Duane Ankarberg, and Wiley Hurst all garnered Oregon victories.

The match was the Ducks' first in their 1958 defense of the Northern Division title.

Portland State proved no contest for the Webfoots, as every Oregon divoter scored a victory. Keith Gubrud had a 74 to pace the Ducks along with Prall.
