

ND meet faces Oregon tracksters

Webfoot thinclads trounce Beavers in ND contest

Oregon's track and field Webfoots, unbeaten in 28 straight dual meets were looking forward to this weekend's big Northern Division meet in Seattle after trouncing arch-rival Oregon State, 91½-38½.

Several of Bill Bowerman's thinclads turned in best ever performances Saturday, as the first warm weather of the current season aided the athletes.

Sophomore Dave Edstrom turned in a :14.3 clocking in the high hurdles, and this time earned many honors. First of all, it won him the race, secondly, it gave him a new dual meet mark, breaking Doug Basham's record of :14.6, and thirdly, it tied Bob Lawson's Hayward field standard set last year in the PCC meet.

Frosh harriers lose to Rooks in Saturday meet

Oregon State Rook depth was too much for the Duckling track squad on Saturday as the Rooks won their second consecutive track contest against the Ducklings by an 86-45 score.

Oregon State won first places in the shot put, 440, high-jump, javelin, 100 yard dash, broad jump, 120 yard hurdles, 880 yard dash, low hurdles, discus and the mile relay.

The Beaver Freshmen were led by ex-Pilot Rock ace Darrell Horn who picked up first places in the high jump and the broad jump.

Oregon picked up first place points as Phil Paquin continued his top-notch form in the pole vault by jumping 14 feet.

Other Duckling winners were George Larson in the mile, Jon Abraham in the 220 and Terry Boatman in the two-mile.

Larson's time in the mile was 4:19.6 and Abraham did the 220 in :23.6 and Boatman did the two-mile in 10:42.4. The Rooks swept only one event, however, and that was in the 880. The Corvallis freshmen also added to their point total by picking up second and third places.

Oregon's Paquin set a new collegiate freshman pole vault mark last week with a vault of 14'8½".

Frosh golfers win sixth match in row

Oregon's freshman golf team stretched its 1958 season win streak to six straight matches Saturday with a hard-fought 9-6 victory over Marshfield high school at Coos Bay.

Tom Shaw of the Ducklings and Larry Bick of Marshfield tied for medalist honors with identical scores of 71. Both won their individual matches, 2½-1½. Shaw topped Marshfield's Dick Wood, while Bick edged Chuck Hunter of Oregon.

Tom Jacobsen of the Frosh fired a 75 to rack-up a 2-1 win over the Pirates' Jack Fitzpatrick.

Duckling Wally Schulz shot a 73 to whitewash Marshfield's John Forrester, 3-0.

Jerry Smythe, Oregon, was trimmed by the Pirates' Dick Long, 2-1.

In all four meet records were set in the meet. Besides Edstrom's mark, Jim Grelle established a new mile record by turning in a 4:12.5 to slice over second off Jim Bailey's old mark; OSC's Duane Marshall broke his own record with a shot put toss of 51'9", and big D.C. Mills uncorked a heave of 231'9½" to smash the old javelin record by more than 20 feet. Mills' toss placed him fifth in the nation this year in his specialty, and second on the Coast.

Two of the day's top performers, however, failed to go into the books as records. Ken Grant's 6'7" leap in the high jump easily won him a first place, but failed to bring a new standard as the great Les Steers holds the dual meet mark of 6'8¾".

Jack Burg, who has been plagued by a sprained ankle all season, finally got off the leap Bowerman was waiting for, as he cleared 14'6" in the pole vault.

This bettered the meet record by four inches, but will not go into the books, as Burg was not an official competitor, staying out of the meet officially, in order that senior vaulter Bob Decker might letter. Needing a first place to win his award, Decker came through in splendid fashion by going 13', which gave him his first and his letter.

Edstrom, besides turning in his outstanding hurdle time, was once again the Ducks' high point man. Edstrom also jumped out 22'9" to easily cap-

ture the broad jump. Edstrom added points with a second in the high jump and a third in the shot to bring his meet total to 14 points, which is not a bad day's work.

Second in the point parade behind Edstrom were juniors Steve Anderson and Otis Davis. Both rang up eight.

Anderson gained his points on a first in the 100, run in the fine time of :09.8, and a second in the javelin, tossing the spear 205'3".

Davis, who is not a good starter but extremely fast once he is put in motion, finished second behind "Andy" in the century and won the 220 going away in :22.4.

Junior Mark Robbins put on a flashy performance in the two mile. For the first three laps he trailed most of the large field, then shot way out in front on the fourth lap. On the gun lap he sprinted almost the entire last quarter, winning his race easily in 9:47.8.

Other Oregon firsts came in the discus and the low hurdles.

Burly Gene "Red" Estes got off his best throw this year in the discus, winning with a toss of 155'10", and having two longer throws on scratches. Doyle Higdon award winner Mike Forrester made it a banner day by taking the low hurdles in :24.7.

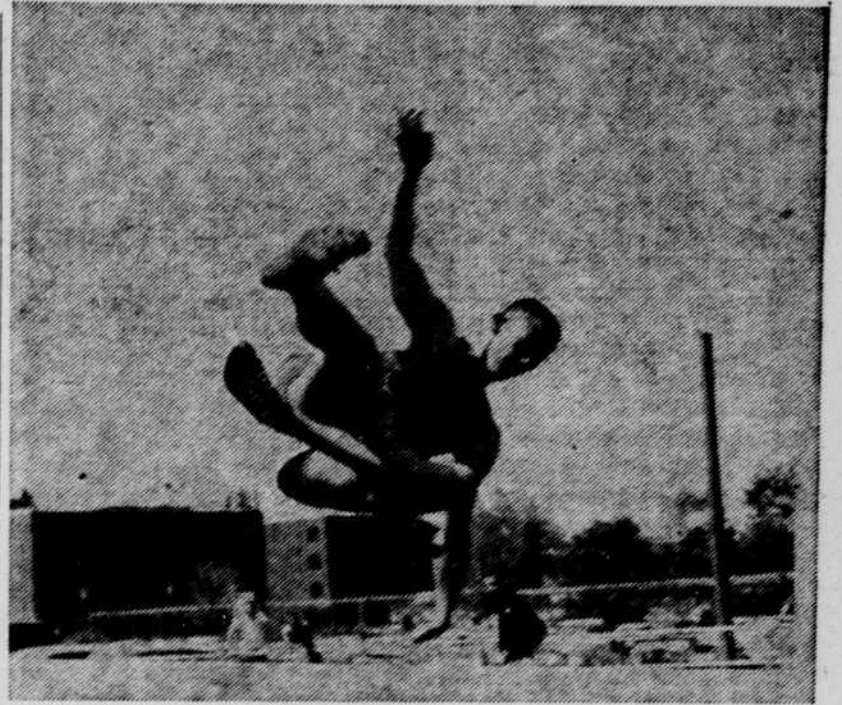
Golfers face OSC in ND action

Oregon's Webfoot linksmen split a pair of non-conference golf matches in Portland Friday and Saturday, defeating Portland State, 11½-6½, Friday, and losing to Columbia-Edgewater Country Club, 14½-3½, Saturday.

Wiley Hurst of Oregon fired a three-under-par 69 to lead the Ducks to Friday's victory. Other Oregon winners were Bob Prall, who racked up a 3-0 triumph; Gary Hval, who won 2-1; and Bruce Titus, who also scored a 3-0 whitewash.

Columbia-Edgewater outclassed the Webfoots Saturday. Oregon was laced in best-ball play, 7½-1½, and C-E walked away with individual match honors as well.

Oregon returns to the Northern Division war May 16 in Corvallis, where the Oregon State Beavers remain the only obstacle in the Ducks' path to their 11th ND title in the past 12 years.

Netters gain one; lose two on trip

Dick Williams' Webfoot tennis quintet took a Northern journey this weekend and returned with a non-conference victory and a pair of non-loop defeats.

Oregon hosts University of British Columbia this afternoon on the University courts.

The Duck netters edged Willamette Thursday only to succumb to Portland U., 5-2, and stayed in the Rose City Saturday for a match with U.O. Med school, who ungraciously levied a 6-1 whipping.

Oregon won only two of the five singles contests against the Bearcats Thursday, but roared back to win both doubles matches and grab the 4-3 decision.

Marv Woods and Phil Lowthian were the Webfoots' two singles

winners. Lowthian teamed up with Wayne Henninger to win the first doubles match, and Woods paired with Larry Ottis to nail down a triumph in the second doubles round.

Portland U. won its 15th matching in 18 starts Friday in trouncing the Ducks, 5-2. Lowthian was Oregon's lone singles winner, while the Webfoot doubles pair of Ottis and Woods earned victory in the second doubles match.

UO's Medical school scored a near-sweep Saturday, winning four of the five singles matches and both doubles contests. Marv Woods was the only Duck to win his singles match.

The Webfoots close the ND season May 17 in Corvallis against OSC.

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UO bowlers lead in NIBC tourney

Oregon's powerful bowling squad moved into a 28-pin lead Saturday in the Northwest International Bowling Congress tournament at Tacoma's Midway Bowl after the completion of two weeks of the four-week tourney.

The Webfoots, who won the Northwest Intercollegiate championship last month, rolled 2919 three game series as compared to the winning score of 2883 by the Windmill Club of Billings, Mont., last year.

Oregon leads second place Bushes Drive-In, which placed 2891 pins. The top teams from the Pacific Coast will try to defeat the Webfoots' mark in the two weeks remaining in the tournament.

Mike Zimmerman paced the Ducks with a 631 series which included a 245 second game. Other scores: Bruce Koppe, 584; Jack Anderson, 579; Denny Kranz, 575; and Don Jacklin, 550.

Coach Louie Bellissimo complemented the squad on its superb bowling exhibition and was especially pleased with the pressure-packed 997 third game score. The Webfoots rolled 900 and 1022 in the first two games.

No less than eight of the five bowlers' 15 games topped 200.

Jacklin and Jim Hendrie moved into third place in the open doubles with 1205, also rolled Saturday night. The top score in the doubles is 1222.



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
