Phil "Buck" Knight, vice president of the Order of the O, said that "very few of the girls objected seriously" to the dunkings.

He said the matter will be discussed soon at a meeting of the club.

Knight said that, while he thought improvements could be made in enforcement of the traditions, if "you have traditions at all they should be enforced."

Two University administrative officials were dismayed at Order of the O action.

A. L. Ellingson, director of the Student Union, said "it's time someone says there is no enforcement of traditions on this campus at all... they (the lettermen) are just 'grabbing girls'."

Dean of Men Ray Hawk expressed his concern over the incidents and asked for student action on the matter.

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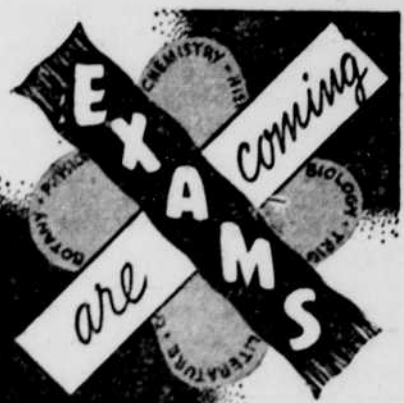
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
