bellion in Algeria. But it left the power to be exercised by Gen. Raoul Salan, the Algerian commander who backs Gen. Charles de Gaulle.

The vote was 475 to 100. The extreme right — Gaullists and Pujadists—and a few conservatives were alone in voting against the bill.

## U.S. to 'do duty'

WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary of State Dulles said Tuesday the United States is not barred by Soviet Communist threats from doing its duty anywhere in the world.

He made the statement at a news conference in discussing the crisis in Lebanon. The Soviet Union has issued warnings against any interference in Lebanon's internal affairs.

Dulles said the President has plenty of authority under a Middle East policy resolution adopted by Congress more than a year ago to act to preserve Lebanon's independence and integrity if necessary and if requested to do so.

Dulles said that Vice President Richard Nixon's decision to go to Caracas, Venezuela—where he was attacked by mobs—was a correct judgment in the light of information available before he went there. But if U.S. officials had known beforehand what they now know he probably would not have gone.

## ICC vetoes plan

WASHINGTON (AP)—A three-man division of the Interstate Commerce Commission Tuesday temporarily vetoed a plan by Far Western railroads to lower freight rates sharply on large quantity lumber shipments between Oregon, California and Arizona.

The division, acting for the full commission, ordered suspension of the proposed changes pending an investigation into their reasonableness.

## Military bill signed

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower signed legislation Thursday boosting military pay, with the aim of making career service more attractive.

The first year cost is figured at half a billion dollars.

## Opposition refuses

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP)—Opposition leaders refused Tuesday to compromise with Lebanon's pro-Western government, beset by riots and pitched battles for 11 days.

They met for 3½ hours with Raymond Edde, a political leader trying to end the strife. Edde also saw pro-government leaders.

The session with anti-government chiefs including Raschid Karami, leader of rioters in the North Lebanese port of Tripoli, ended without agreement. The opposition representatives said they had refused to compromise.

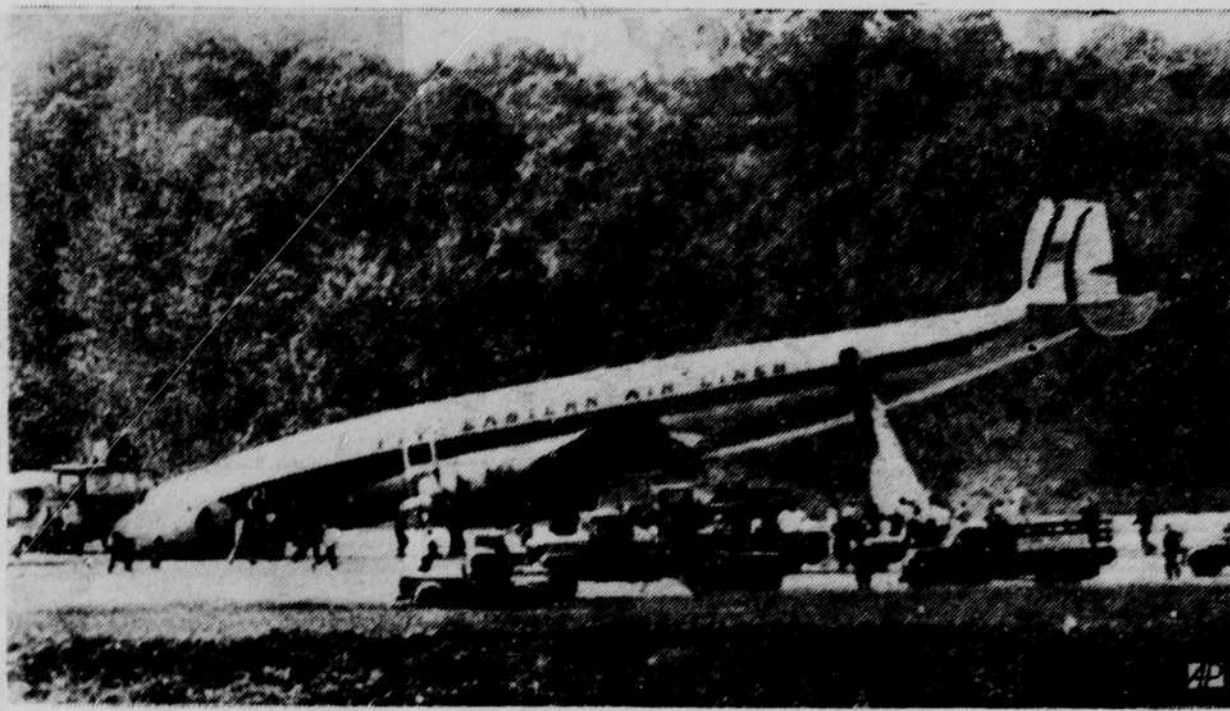
An estimated 200 persons have been killed in street fighting and in battles in the mountains.
