

Honors program enrolls 32; schools give requirements

As a result of stepped-up upper-division honors programs in 10 University departments, 32 persons are now registered, according to H. T. Koplin, chairman of the Honors Council and assistant professor of economics.

Koplin said that this number does not represent all those participating since many persons have not registered with him.

The English department leads in number of registered students with six juniors and four seniors. Other schools which are participating are comparative literature, business administration, economics, history, political science, foreign language, journalism, physics and chemistry. Each of these departments has set up its individual requirements.

There are a few departments which have not set up over-all programs but do have students working in individual programs.

The basic University requirements for honors candidates are a 2.75 G.P.A. or higher when beginning the program, maintaining a 3.00 G.P.A. during each term of honors work, completion of all

lower-division requirements and a final examination at the end of the honors work.

Each department or school is left with the job of setting up its own program.

In chemistry, honors candidates must conduct a research project and present a written report on the project and take a final oral examination.

In economics the student takes an economic theory course, a 9 hour sequence in economics at the 400 level, an honors seminar, an honors essay and a comprehensive oral examination.

Reading, conference

English candidates must complete six to 15 hours of independent work, write an essay, attend evening discussions, and take a final written examination.

The foreign language department is currently revising its old program which included reading and conference requirements, a thesis and a final examination.

In history the program includes a special junior honors course, optional reading, senior reading and research, an honors essay and a final oral examination.

In mathematics the student

must complete a three year sequence at the 400 level, complete a reading requirement and take an oral examination.

The physics department requires a minimum G.P.A. of 3.3 in upper division courses and a final examination.

Journalism requirements listed

Political science candidates must take nine hours of reading and conference, a nine hour thesis and a final oral examination.

The journalism school requires a course in Law of the Press, reading and conference, an honors project, a 3.00 G.P.A., an A— or better on the senior thesis, a minor in some related subject and a final oral examination.

Physical education candidates must complete nine hours of reading and conference, a thesis and a final written and oral examination.

Comparative literature students must show a strong minor in some related department, take a reading and conference requirement, write a thesis and take a final examination.

Clark chairman

In general social science, persons must take a 400 sequence, have a 3.2 G.P.A. over-all, write a research paper, take a written exam on social problems and a final comprehensive oral examination.

R. D. Clark, dean of the College of Liberal Arts, said that a committee is now considering the combination of the sophomore and senior honors programs. The committee has had several meetings and has more meetings scheduled.

Trials speeded up

HAVANA (UPI)—Rebel troops of Fidel Castro Monday stepped up their war crimes trials of Batista henchmen.

In Santiago, the first 14 of 70 persons tried were convicted and executed. No word has been received of the fate of the remainder of the 70 accused, but it is assumed they will be executed in small groups upon conviction.

In Havana, 15 members of the Batista intelligence service were reported to have been executed after trials.

Ike, Mikoyan to meet

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Eisenhower and Soviet Deputy Premier Mikoyan will meet here Saturday.

The talks are expected to center on the Berlin crisis and other East-West tensions.

Secretary of State Dulles also will take part in the discussions.

Symington disagrees

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Stuart Symington (D-Mo) challenged Vice President Nixon Monday to prove the United States is now ahead of Russia in ballistic missiles.

Symington told the Senate that if Nixon made an observation to that effect, "it is not correct — and I do not know a single impartial expert in the missile field who would support it."

The senator is a former Secretary of the Air Force under President Harry S. Truman and a member of the Senate Armed Services Special Space Committees. He took issue with information given newsmen Sunday that Nixon says the United States is ahead of Russia in developing military missiles and is catching up fast in other phases of the space race.

Molotov switch seen

MOSCOW (AP)—A Dutch source here said the Soviet Union has asked the Netherlands to approve former Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov as ambassador to The Hague.

Molotov is now ambassador to Outer Mongolia. He was assigned to that far-off spot after he was denounced as a member of the so-called antiparty group.

A Dutch official said at The Hague Saturday the Soviet Union had been informed the Dutch had no objection.

Later, however, a spokesman for the Dutch Foreign Ministry said the report was not true.

Rocket 'in orbit'

MOSCOW (AP)—The Soviet Union's new cosmic rocket has steered itself past the moon and into orbit around the sun, Pravda reported Monday.

The Communist party newspaper, in a two-page article on interplanetary flight, said the missile launched Jan. 2 utilized an automatic guidance system which kept it on a predetermined trajectory and regulated its final speed.
