Hatfield outlines

sharing the costs of government. Income remains the best measure of ability to pay and every income earner owes at least a small fraction for the services he receives from his government."

He had no specific comments on the 299-million dollar budget submitted by Holmes, but promised he would have specific recommendations about it later.

Other recommendations

Hatfield's other important recommendations:

1. Require insurance companies to provide motorists with protection against damages or injuries caused by drivers who don't have liability insurance. This is Hatfield's answer to Holmes' proposal to require every motorist to carry liability insurance.

2. Prohibit job discrimination because of a person's age.

3. Increase employer's payroll taxes and take other steps to keep the Unemployment Trust Fund solvent.

4. Give property tax exemptions to persons over 65 years old who have income under \$2,500 a year and whose home is worth less than \$7,500. Adopt capital gains provision and eliminate inequities in the personal property tax.

5. Have the superintendent of public instruction, now elected, appointed by the Board of Education. Consider whether the attorney general and labor commissioner, also elected now, should be appointed.

Gas tax increase

6. Adopt a system whereby a commission of lawyers would nominate persons to be appointed to the Supreme Court. The governor would appoint from this list. Withhold from adding two more justices to the Supreme Court because the court's delays might be alleviated by the recent provision that circuit judges can be named as temporary justices.

7. Either increase the gas tax one cent a gallon, or be prepared to have the state lag behind in highway construction for failure to be able to match federal funds.

8. Repeal the 1953 law which bans picketing for the purpose of forcing workers to join a union. Require secret ballots in labor union elections and strict accounting of union funds.
