Utility bill passed

SALEM (AP) — The Oregon Senate passed 20-9 Thursday and sent to the House a bill to assess utilities 30 per cent more than other classes of property, and to exempt the first 10 per cent of the true cash value of dwellings.

Eighteen Democrats and Republicans Sens. Edwin R. Durno, Medford, and Francis W. Ziegler, Corvallis, voted for the bill. All nine votes against the bill, bitterly fought by the utilities, were cast by Republicans.

Hatfield sets trip

SALEM (AP) — Gov. Mark Hatfield will be in Washington, D. C. Saturday to confer with President Eisenhower and attend the annual Gridiron Banquet.

Hatfield said he will discuss the proposed Green Peter Dam on the South Santiam River with the President. He also plans to do some promotion work on Oregon's centennial on the trip.

He plans to confer with members of Oregon's congressional delegation.

Fossils, minerals shown in library

Books as a pathway to knowledge of Oregon, from beaches to flowers to animals, is the topic of the March exhibit in the University of Oregon library circulation hall.

Arranged by the library catalog department, the exhibit contains fossils and minerals from the university geology department and driftwood, shells and fishing net floats from the collections of beachcombing members of the library staff.

Photographs of the ocean, Crater Lake and other parts of Oregon are also included in the exhibit, as well as pictures of wild flowers and Oregon birds and animals.

It is particularly important, he said, because of the information it includes on the Great Leap Forward, China's efforts to transform herself into an industrial state, and for the attempt it makes to explain the why and how of China's acceptance of communism.

Chinese fear West

In his own analysis of modern China, Dull said he believes the Chinese are stimulated by fear of the west and by pride in controlling their own destiny.

Dull closed his lecture by saying: "The nature of the stresses waged in the world today transcends the problems with communism, population, technology, and machines. We have reached a critical junction in man's history: is man to retain his originality, or is he to be reduced to 'the Ant Hill'?"
