

Economist Staley plans to visit UO as lecturer

Eugene Staley, senior international economist, Stanford Research Institute, will be a visitor on campus Wednesday and Thursday.

Staley, a guest of the economics department, will deliver a Browsing Room lecture Wednesday at 7:30 p.m. entitled "India, China and American Policy towards the Newly Developing Countries."

Marshall D. Wattles, associate professor of economics and assistant dean of the College of Liberal Arts, will serve as discussion leader.

During his two day visit Staley will also conduct an economics department seminar and consult with students in the department.

Staley, a graduate of Hastings College, received his doctorate from the University of Chicago in 1928. He has served on the faculties of the University of Chicago, the Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy and Stanford University.

Government agencies with which he has been associated include the Department of State, Bureau of the Budget, UNRRA and the International Bank for Reconstruction and Development. He is also the author of many books and articles in the field of economic development.

"I should expect to work with the President to:

1. achieve a stronger, more unified cabinet which would in turn be better able to deal with 'campus wide' problems.
2. work for a clarification of the duties of the various organs of student government and to facilitate communications between them.
3. conduct further evaluation (in conjunction with the Student Activities Evaluation Committee) of present student activities, and work with all energy to establish an effective coordinating body which may eventually eliminate unprofitable activities.
4. concentrate on a good student assembly program.
5. establish an effective method of dealing with campus disciplinary problems."

Bud Titus, ASUO president, said that there is a large number of student-donated Co-op receipts which have not been counted.

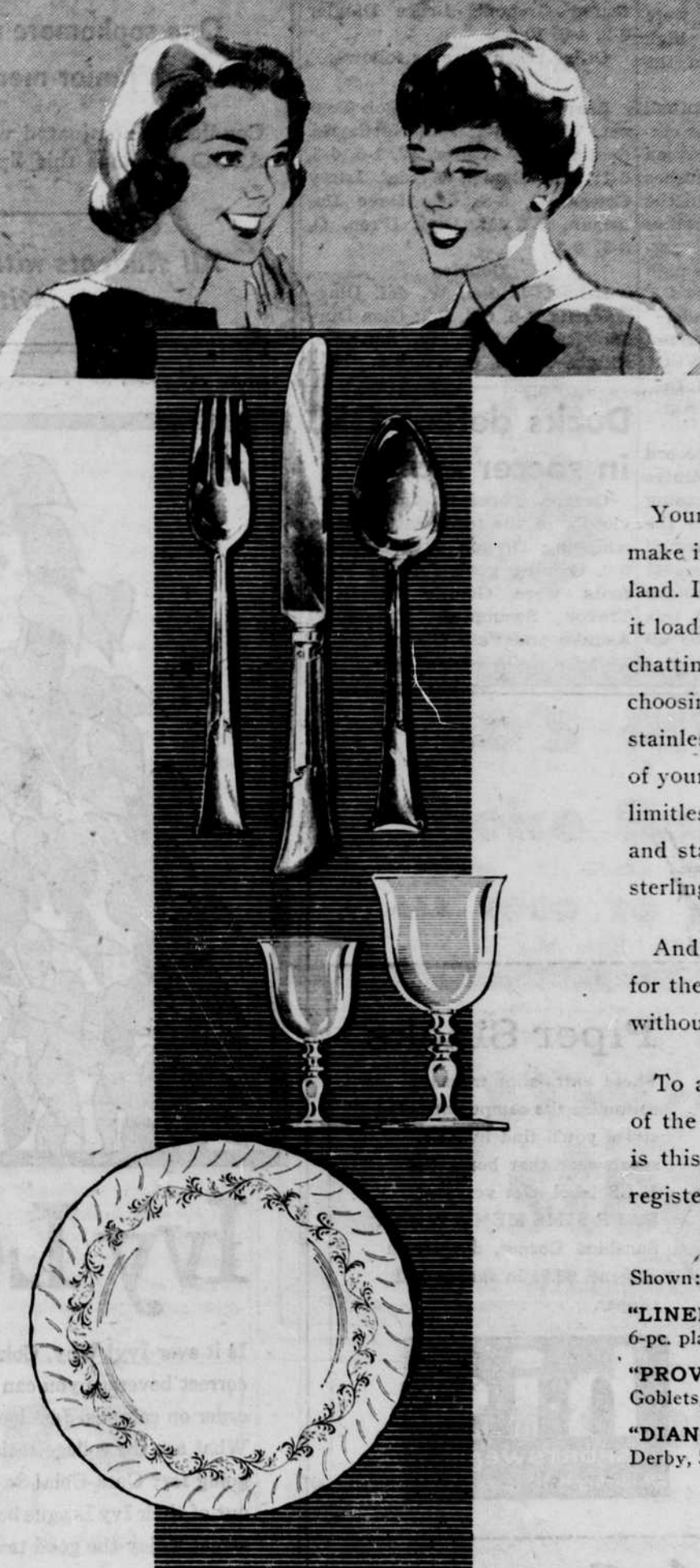
