

Five records set...

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Husky miler was his eleventh straight victory over his northern foe.

Burg set his record in the equally-close pole vault contest by soaring 14'3 1/2", erasing the old mark of 14'2" set by Cliff LaBounty of Washington, who finished third Saturday. Burg's teammate Phil Paquin finished second with 14'.

The third Duck record breaker was Dick Miller who ran a 9:08.8 two mile in breaking the old record by nearly 10 seconds. Mark Robbins of the Ducks, the old record holder with 9:18.4, finished second to Miller by running the distance in 9:20, just one-half second better than Ernie Brannon of Washington.

The lone Husky record breaker was Anacker in the discus. The burly Husky heaved the wooden plate 161'10". His throw erased the old record distance of 160'1 1/4" set by Ed Moeller of Oregon way back in 1929.

One of the most exciting races of the day produced no record breaking results. This race was one which will long be remembered in the minds of Duck cinder fans because it produced the first 440-yard dash defeat of Terry Tobacco, defending PCC champion in that event.

The victor in this race was the Ducks' Otis Davis who came to Oregon to play basketball but ended up as a track star. The slender 26-year-old veteran from Los Angeles entered the race with a tightly taped thigh as a result of a pulled muscle suffered in the Northern Division Relays a week earlier.

Davis started the race in a most peculiar fashion by using no starting blocks (because of his leg) and got off to a slow start. Tobacco, who drew lane

one, and Davis in the second lane, were even coming out of the south turn and battled neck-and-neck up the backstretch. Tobacco gained a stride on the Duck 440 ace going into the final turn but Davis pulled even with the defending champion in the final 100 yards and won the race dramatically by making a powerful lunge at the finish line.

Davis' final lunge for the tape was so spectacular that he ended up sprawled flat on the cinders. The race was so close that the times for both runners were identical: 48.6. Close behind but unnoticed by many because of the exciting Davis-Tobacco finish was Rick Harder of the Huskies in 48.7.

Two Webfoots were double winners in the sweep over the Puget Sound squad. Steve Anderson won the low hurdles in 23.7 and was also victorious in the broadjump, leaping 23'3".

The other double winner for the home town squad was Roscoe Cook the sophomore sprinter from San Diego. Cook did not participate in the Ducks first two meets of the year but was right in the thick of things Saturday as he streaked to victories in the 100 and 220-yard dashes. His winning times were 9.7 and 21.7 for the two respective events.

Other Oregon victors were Dave Edstrom in the high hurdles and Ken Grant in the high jump.

Two Oregon gridiron football stars made their first home cinder appearance. Dave Grayson collected two third place finishes in the 100-yard dash and in the broadjump. Len Burnett, another of Len Casanova's gridders, garnered a second place in the high hurdles and third in the lows.

The amazing Duck cinder-men will next face the perennial NCAA champions the USC Trojans and the Stanford Indians in a triangular meet Saturday at Palo Alto.

USC has the greatest record ever compiled by a United States collegiate track squad, winning 82 straight dual meets over the past years. Stanford is expected to field one of their strongest teams in history. The Indians have already downed UCLA this year and are expected to be all primed for this meet.

UO takes second in tournament

The University of Oregon captured second place in the Women's Northwest Regional Bowling Tournament held in the Student Union Friday and Saturday.

The Oregon bowlers were defeated by Central Washington College of Education. The winners won the team event held Friday night by gaining 2245 total pins to Oregon's 2090.

In doubles competition held Saturday Margaret DuPuis and Marie Longfellow of Oregon also finished second. The Oregon bowlers were defeated by Carolyn Hildreth and Diana Houston of Clark College.

Misses Dupuis and Longfellow combined for a 982 series while the winners scored 1004. Miss Dupuis was edged in singles com-

petition by Miss Hildreth 549 to 490.

The all-events competition was won by CWCE's Pat Lacey with a total of 1507. Miss Lacey edged out Miss Dupuis who tallied 1504 in the all-events competition.

Next year's tournament will be held at Washington State College.

Willamette trips Webfoot netmen

The Oregon varsity tennis squad tasted defeat for the first time this year as they lost a 5-2 decision to unbeaten Willamette in Salem Saturday.

The number one men of both squads battled to a two and one-half hour marathon match before Willamette's Tim Campbell defeated Oregon's Bruce Dingler 6-2, 4-6, 10-8.

Burleson paces Frosh victory

Dyrol Burleson wrote his name in the National Collegiate Track and Field record book Saturday, winning the mile in the time 4:07.6, the fastest freshman mile ever run. Burleson set the pace as the Ducklings walloped their freshman rivals from OSC 84-47.

In addition to Burleson, Coach Martin Pedigo received outstanding performances from Jim Puckett, who turned out to be the afternoon's only triple winner, winning the 100 yd. dash in 9.8, the 220 in 21.9 and the broad jump, leaping 21'1 1/2". The speedy redhead finished his afternoon on the winning relay team.

Jerry Stubblefield walked away with discus honors as his heave traveled 162'10" a foot farther than the varsity meet record of 161'10". He also placed second in the shot put and the 100 with the time of 9.9.

The only double winner was Don Milligan, who swept both the high and low hurdles in the time of 15.1 and 24.3 respectively.

Other winners for the Frosh were Dick Brown, who threw the shot 51'7 1/2"; Fred Thomas, who tied for high jumping honors at 6'1"; Bob Thrush and Dave Williamson who deadlocked in the pole vault at 12'6" and the relay team consisting of Stan Miller, Lewis Powell, Burleson and Puckett.

Miller, the versatile Portland star, placed second in the 440 and broad jump and third in the high jump and ran on the relay team.

Pedigo summed up the day by saying, "We came through better than I expected and I was well satisfied by the results."
