Castro heads troops

HAVANA (UPI) — Reports from Santiago, Cuba, indicate that Premier Fidel Castro has taken personal command of a campaign against anti-government guerilla forces.

Dispatches from the area say worker militia units for the first time have gone into action with rebel army troops to hunt for guerrilla in the Sierra Maestra, the onetime Castro mountain stronghold.

Airline threatened

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A British aircraft firm threatens to foreclose mortgages on Capital Airlines' 96-plane fleet.

Vickers-Armstrong, manufacturers of the jet-prop Viscount, says Capital is overdue on paying nearly 12-million dollars of a nearly 34-million-dollar note.

Capital has asked the government for a mail subsidy to help ease its financial pangs.

Another missile works

WESTOVER AIR FORCE BASE, Massachusetts (UPI) — An Air Force B-52 bomber has made a successful strike with a new Hound Dog missile after making a 10,800 mile flight.

The missile made a flight of several hundred miles to hit its target.

Geologist will lecture on Alaska

J. Ben Carsey will deliver an all-University lecture tonight at 8 o'clock in 123 Science. Carsey, who is Exploration Advisor for Humble Oil and Refining Company, will speak on "The Geology and Oil Development in Alaska."

He will present his lecture to 44 geological societies and University groups between March 1 and May 20.

The lecture will include a selection of Kodachrome pictures taken on his trips to Alaska. Carsey will review the regional geology of Alaska from the point of view of possible oil production.

Carsey is a member of several geological societies and is presently chairman of the research committee of the American Association of Petroleum Geologists.

Police capture patient in SU

An unidentified mental patient who wandered away from Sacred Heart hospital Tuesday afternoon was captured on the mezzanine of the Student Union around 2:40 p.m. after a chase across the library quad and through the Fishbowl of the SU.

A HOSPITAL attendant began the chase near the steps on the west side of the library quad. According to an eye witness, sophomore Joe Sand, the attendant approached the patient and asked him to stop. Sand said the man stopped, faced the attendant, spread his arms, and said, "I don't want to fight." The attendant answered, "I know it. Why don't you stop and let me talk it over with you. I don't want to fight either."

Sand said the man then turned around and started walking rapidly towards the SU. The attendant followed behind him.

THE PATIENT sprinted into the Fishbowl after he saw two police cars approaching on University Street.

The police cars parked outside the SU and several policemen and the hospital attendant ran into the SU after the man. The man ran through the Fishbowl, followed by students and the policemen, and was finally apprehended on the mezzanine by students who held him until policemen caught up with him. He was handcuffed and driven away under police escort.

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Roundtable topic to feature botanist

Sten Rentzog, an exchange student from Sweden, will narrate a movie about Carl Linnaeus, a noted Swedish botanist of the eighteenth century, at the Roundtable discussion today at 4 p.m. in the Student Union.

Linnaeus was the first to enunciate the principles for defining genera and species of plants and to adhere to a uniform use of specific names. A volume he published in 1736 is considered the starting-point of modern systematic botany.

Rentzog is a senior in history at the University and has attended the University of Upsala in Sweden, the same institution where Linnaeus was educated.

Pictures of Northern Europe and the University of Upsala, founded in 1477, will also be shown. After the 25-minute film, there will be a discussion period when Rentzog will answer questions.

Turner, Millikin get Emerald posts

duties May 9, when the term of present editor Larry Kurtz expires.

The Board also named sophomore Steve Millikin to the post of Emerald business manager, and sophomore Jay Jackson to the position of Oregon business manager.

Millikin will take over May 9, when Warren Rucker's term runs out, and Jackson will take over Dave Rianda's current duties next fall.

TURNER WAS opposed by Emerald news editor Ranny Green in the editorship competition, while Jackson was opposed by Northwest Review business manager Barbara Brooks. Millikin ran unopposed for Emerald business manager.

Kurtz, Rucker, and Rianda did not re-petition.

Turner announced a tentative staff that includes Gary Sala, managing editor; Annette Davenport, news editor; Sue Hunter, women's editor; Mary Jo Stewart, editorial page editor; Ted Mahar and Keith Powell, assistant news editors; and Dulcy Moran, feature editor.

KURTZ WILL take over the sports editor's position, and will be assisted by the current sports head, Al Hynding.

Turner said that he is "confident The Emerald will continue to keep the student body informed of important campus events, with the goal in mind of constantly expanding and improving its coverage."

Millikin said that he would strive for "a mutually favorable ad-news ratio" and attempt to offer "quality" advertising to the student body. He is a member of Phi Kappa Psi fraternity.

Jackson, a member of Sigma Phi Epsilon, said that the new four-section Oregon format would be "a great challenge," and one that would require "some re-examining of the current business staff setup."

'Inventions' subject of Barnett's lecture

Homer P. Barnett, professor of anthropology at the University, will discuss cultural changes and inventions with particular attention to the aspect of humorous inventions, at the Browsing Room lecture tonight at 7:30 in the Student Union.

E. G. EBBIGHAUSEN, professor of physics, will introduce the talk entitled "Ridiculous Inventions."

"I'M GOING to be talking on inventions, and I want to take one aspect of inventions and dwell on that. This is the aspect that occasions laughter. What I want to suggest is that every invention causes people to laugh, no matter how serious the inventor takes it," Barnett said.

"This is true of all inventions," he added. "There are some inventions that are intended to make people laugh. The same formula is used in making a serious invention as in a humorous one. It just depends on the intentions of the inventor."

Barnett said he would illustrate how examples of serious inven-

tions have been taken humorously. He cited the steam engine, automobiles, and the airplane when first introduced as examples. He said he would also include inventions that were intended as obvious jokes. His talk will be illustrated by slides.

BARNETT HAS been at the University since 1932, where he has maintained a major interest in field work, research studies, and teaching. While at the University, he has written many articles for scholarly journals, monographs and books. One of
