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Russia warned

WASHINGTON (UPI) — America, Britain and France again have warned Russia that the Western powers will not be forced out of Berlin against their will.

The foreign ministers of the three allies announced that outstanding problems between Russia and the West will be settled "by negotiation and not by force or unilateral action."

The ministers met in Washington Tuesday to discuss pre-summit strategy.

Cubans seek refuge

MIAMI (UPI) — A Cuban pilot and two crewmen and a passenger fled Havana Tuesday and sought political refuge in Miami.

They made the trip in a Cuban airliner and the pilot apparently sabotaged its engines on landing. Their flight climaxed more than one month of secret planning.

Eight die in crash

RIO DE JANEIRO (UPI) — A twin-engined airliner with 22 persons aboard crashed on take-off Tuesday at Pelotas in Southern Brazil.

Eight persons were killed and three were injured. A spokesman for Varig Airlines said the dead include six passengers and two crewmen.

Radio search starts

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The National Science Foundation has

launched a search for radio signals from intelligent beings on other planets.

The search was started Monday night at the national radio astronomy observatory at Green Bank, West Virginia.

The 85-foot radio telescope will focus on two relatively nearby stars. Both are about 11 light years, or 66 million million (not a printer's error) miles, away.

Testimony promised

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A former Roosevelt brain truster, attorney Thomas Corcoran, has agreed to testify on behind-the-scenes contact with Federal Power Commission officials about a pending rate case.

Two FPC members also say they will appear at the House hearing.

The commerce subcommittee hearing has been set back from Thursday to May 2.
