

Sam Jones' 3-hitter gives Giants 3-1 win over Cards—Braves win

SAN FRANCISCO—Sad Sam Jones threw a three-hitter and Orlando Cepeda drove in three runs as San Francisco defeated St. Louis 3-1.

It was the inaugural game of San Francisco's plush new Candlestick Park.

In the first inning, Cepeda tripled off loser Larry Jackson to drive in two unearned runs. In the third he drove in Willie Mays after Mays had smacked a double off the right-center field fence, 397 feet away.

Jones now has beaten St. Louis five times without a loss since the Cardinals traded him to the Giants in March, 1959.

Leon Wagner of St. Louis became the first player to hit a home run in the new park when he smashed one some 350 feet over the right field barrier.

A home run by Joe Adcock with a man on base gave Milwaukee its 4-3 win over Pittsburgh. The winning blow into the right field bleachers came off Roy Face, who relieved Bob Friend in the eighth.

Warren Spahn started for Milwaukee but he was knocked out when Pittsburgh rallied to score two runs in the eighth. Don McMahon was the winning pitcher.

At Cincinnati, the Redlegs spotted the Philadelphia Phillies four early runs and then went on to win, 9-4. A brilliant six-inning relief job by Jib O'Toole got the Reds off to a victorious start before a sell-out crowd of 30,000.

Robin Roberts, making his eleventh opening day start, was

the victim of home run blasts that helped Cincinnati gain the victory.

Roy McMillan homered in the second with two on and Tony Gonzalez hit one in the fifth with one on. O'Toole was the winning pitcher.

Exhibition baseball

Three shutouts featured the exhibition baseball schedule in Florida.

Tom Sturdivant and Al Worthington held Detroit to one hit and pitched the Boston Red Sox to a 3-0 win. The lone hit was a 7th inning single by Harvey Kuenn.

The Red Sox picked up 10 hits off Don Mossi and Paul Foytack but were held scoreless until the sixth. Pumpsy Green doubled and scored on Frank Malzone's sacrifice for the only run yielded by Mossi. The other two Boston runs were off Paul Foytack in the eighth and ninth.

At Miami, rookie Dick Hall lived up to his billing by pitching Kansas City to a 3-0 victory over the Baltimore Orioles. Hall out-pitched knuckleballer Hoyt Wilhelm, who was tagged for 11 hits and all of Kansas City's runs. Wes Stock relieved him in the ninth.

Gene Freese homered for the Chicago White Sox in the sixth to give the Sox a big five run inning against Washington. The Sox won, 5-0. Freese's homer came with two on base. Frank Baumann and Ray Moore blanked the Senators on three singles.

At St. Petersburg, the Yankees suffered another defeat, this time a 7-4 setback at the hands of the

Cleveland Indians. Rookie Wynn Hawkins was the winning pitcher, while Bob Turley was charged with the defeat. Yogi Berra homered for New York and Rocky Colavito hit one for the Indians.

Oregon student wins college billiards title

Two University students participated in competition last week-end at West Lafayette, Indiana, in the National College Billiards Finals.

Darlene McCabe, a freshman in architecture, and Les Ross, a senior in history, both advanced to the finals on the Purdue campus, with Miss McCabe winning the national coed pocket billiards title.

Both Oregon entrants had competed in a telegraph tournament with hundreds of other college billiard players last month, and were selected for the tourney on basis of best individual scores. They represented the Northwest region of the country, which included parts of Idaho, Washington and Oregon.

Back at Lafayette, Miss McCabe faced the two other finalists in her special event, the "14.1 coed pocket billiards," and emerged victorious with two consecutive victories and the individual championship.

To gain the title, Miss McCabe had to defeat Betty Davis of Iowa State College and Louise Hawkins of Purdue.

Ross entered the straight rails billiard competition in the three-day tournament and was defeated in his two matches.

Ross lost in the first day of competition to George Izaguirre of Purdue, 67-75, and was defeated again during the second day of action by Ted Kohl, 38-75.

THE NATIONAL college billiards championships are divided into four fields of competition, the men's pocket billiards, open three cushion billiards, straight rail, and coed pocket billiards.

The tourney this year was held last Thursday, Friday and Saturday on the Purdue campus.
