Payola hearings end

THE HOUSE (UPI) — House investigators have wound up their payola hearings.

The House subcommittee announced it had uncovered record company payments totaling more than \$263,000 to broadcasting personnel in 42 cities.

The inquiry was climaxed by a two-day appearance by TV disc jockey Dick Clark.

Aged program begins

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Informed sources say the administration will recommend a new medical program for the aged today.

Under the program, most persons over 65 will be given a chance to buy hospital and nursing home insurance at a subsidized rate of \$34 a year.

Sources say the administration will propose that federal and state governments share the cost.

Ike sees new weapons

COLUMBUS, Georgia (UPI) — President Eisenhower has ended a tour of an infantry center at Columbus, Georgia, and returned by plane to Washington.

During his visit, Mr. Eisenhower saw an arsenal of highly mobile infantry weapons.

Unveiled for the first time was the "Davy Crockett" nuclear rocket system.

MOSCOW (UPI) — Cleveland industrialist Cyrus Eaton has won a Lenin Peace Prize for what is described as his "lofty idea of peaceful coexistence."

Space bill approved

CAPITOL HILL (UPI) — The Senate has approved a civilian space authorization bill, totalling 50-million dollars more than asked by President Eisenhower.

The measure will fix a ceiling of 970-million dollars on Federal Space Agency spending in the next fiscal year.

Investigation launched

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Civil Rights Commission says it has started investigating alleged job discrimination by the Armed Forces and the National Guard.

It says the investigation will cover the assignment of duties and hiring of civilians.

The Commission says it will also study any employment discrimination where the government pays part of the salary.

Brazil crash kills five

SAN JUAN (UPI) — A Brazilian aircraft has crashed and burned on the runways of Ramey Air Force Base in Puerto Rico.

Five unidentified persons aboard the plane burned to death.

The twin-engine, C-46 transport was enroute to San Juan from Miami.

Palace cleaned at last

PARIS (UPI) — The French government is taking advantage of President and Mrs. De Gaulle's 17-day absence from the country.

The outside of the Presidential palace will be given a good cleaning.

Says one official: "It needed it, it hadn't been done in 140 years."

Coeds to vote on amendment

Women students voting at ASUO polls today will have an opportunity to vote on a proposed amendment to the Associated Women Students' constitution.

If passed, the amendment will add an upper-class dormitory representative and freshman representative to the AWS legislature.

THE PROPOSED amendment reads as follows:

"It is hereby moved that the AWS Constitution be amended as follows: Article V, Section II, Clause 1, shall be amended to read: 'The Legislature shall consist of the AWS Cabinet; the presidents of YWCA, WRA, Panhellenic, Junior Panhellenic, Mortar Board, Phi Theta Upsilon, Kwama, Coed-coop Council and Alpha Lambda Delta; the chairman elected by the scholarship board; a dormitory counselor representative, one freshman class representative and one upper-class dormitory rep.'"

ARTICLE V, Section II, Clause 2, shall read: "At the beginning of fall term the Cabinet shall call for petitions for the positions of one freshman class representative and one upper-class dormitory representative. Shortly thereafter, the senior members of legislature shall interview all petitioners.

"They shall construct a slate of at least two candidates for each position, which shall be approved by a majority vote of the legislature. Separate ballots shall then be prepared. Ballots for upper-class dormitory representative shall be presented to the president of each upper-class dormitory. Elections shall be held in each upper-class dormitory on a date specified by Legislature. The

candidates must be elected by a majority vote.

"The freshman representative shall be elected during the time of, and with ASUO permission, at the same polling places as, the freshman class elections. She must be elected by a majority vote, with at least ten per cent of the freshman women enrolled in the University voting."

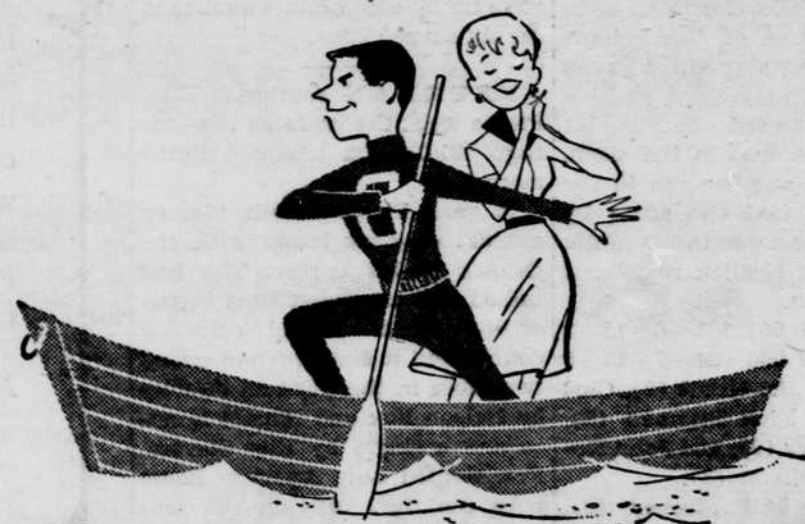
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PATRIOTIC TALE
