Mrs. Pressman was selected in 1941 by the football team to welcome visiting alumni and reigned over homecoming with the title of "Hello Girl."

person of high attainments; one versed on one or more branches of learning." Evidently Mr. Webster recognized the fact that it was impossible to dictate whether a true scholar should be concerned with general information or confined to one field of interest.

THE PURPOSE of any university is to promote study and research to benefit the people who support the institution through gifts, grants and taxes. Their investment is justified by the training of teachers, accountants, lawyers, doctors, journalists, architects and salesmen as well as philosophers. No one of the above can righteously claim to be any better educated than the others. If a person is able to determine an area of interest or specific occupation, it seems illogical to

condemn that individual for attempting to take advantage of every opportunity to learn more about the objective. For example, would a man with tuberculosis be better served by a trained physician or by a Shakespearean quotation of "Out damn spot"?

Mr. Glenn stated that he was astonished at the present educational desires at the university, perhaps by the end of his third week of college, he will agree that these desires do develop scholars.
