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Democratic congressional candidate demanded to know if such negotiations were in progress.

The issue, dormant since two years ago when the administration tried to get the Nationalists to reduce their garrisons on the islands, has become a campaign issue between Kennedy and Nixon.

Kennedy in New York

NEW YORK CITY (UPI) — Senator Kennedy says Vice President Nixon is traveling the road to "irresponsibility" in advocating the defense of the off-shore islands of Quemoy and Matsu.

The Democratic presidential candidate is in Manhattan preparing for the third debate with Nixon this evening.

Kenedy says the two islands held by the Nationalist Chinese are not sufficient reason to get America into a war.

Nixon in home state

LONG BEACH, California (UPI) — Vice President Nixon campaigned through his home state of California, hitting issues ranging from high prices to the coast of China.

At a speech in Long Beach he called for "a new look at American Aviation" and possible elevation of the Federal Aviation Agency to cabinet status.

He also discussed defense of Quemoy and Matsu islands and the cost of Senator Kennedy's domestic programs.

Johnson campaigns

TAMPA, Florida (UPI) — Senator Lyndon Johnson told a Tampa crowd the front line of the cold war is a half an hour's plane ride from Florida.

The Democratic vice presidential candidate added, "if this administration took any action to prevent Cuba from going Communist it is certainly the best kept secret in the last eight years."

Lodge raps Kennedy

NEW YORK CITY (UPI) — Republican vice presidential nominee Henry Cabot Lodge says Senator Kennedy's stand on the Quemoy-Matsu issue is "rash, imprudent and dangerous."

Lodge said, "these islands are not merely rocks. They symbolize much for both the free and the Communist worlds."

Leftists demonstrate

TOKYO (UPI) — Leftist demonstrators with signs reading "Rise for the Revolution" fought police in Tokyo yesterday and at least 82 persons were injured, one of them seriously.

The 15,000 snake dancing Japanese were protesting the assassination of the opposition Socialist leader Asanuma.

The Socialist chief was stabbed to death by a 17-year-old ultra-Nationalist during a political rally in Tokyo.

Third bomb explodes

NEW YORK CITY (UPI) — The third mystery bomb blast in 11 days exploded in New York City yesterday in the subway station under Times Square.

Police said 27 persons were injured, one seriously.

At least 20 were taken to hospitals.

Police Commissioner Stephen Kennedy took charge of the investigation and ordered extra police to patrol congested areas.

Asylum granted

NEW YORK CITY (UPI) — A 29-year-old seaman who fled

Communism from Soviet Premier Khrushchev's liner "Baltika" has been granted political asylum by the U.S.

The Estonian, Viktor Jaanets, immediately went into hiding for fear of Soviet attempts to put him back behind the Iron Curtain.

The Immigration Service said he will be released under the sponsorship of the International Rescue Committee.

Goldfine incompetent

BOSTON (UPI) — A Federal court judge in Boston has ruled industrialist Bernard Goldfine is "mentally incompetent" to stand trial.

Goldfine is charged with evading \$791,000 in personal and corporate income taxes from 1953 to 1957.

He was ordered returned to a hospital in suburban Brighton until Federal authorities decide whether to move him to another institution.

Men are being checked at the Lane County Blood Bank in an effort to find donors with the A-Positive blood needed for a heart operation on Amanda Dao, October 27.

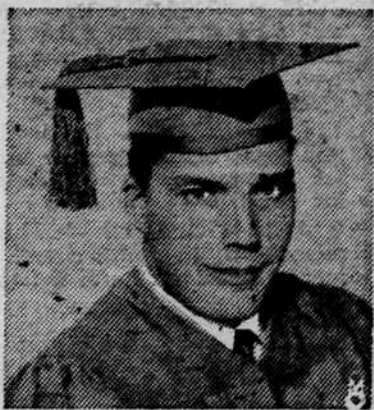
Nineteen units is the goal for the drawing at the blood bank October 26. The names of men with the needed type are being registered at the Student Affairs office.
