

Ducks rally to gain deadlock, 14-14

A fourth quarter comeback and a determined last-ditch stand saved the Oregon Ducks from defeat, but there was no victory either as the 64th annual "civil war" with Oregon State ended in a 14-14 tie at Parker Stadium in Corvallis, Saturday.

Hard running OSC tailback, Don Kasso, eluded Duck defenders time and again to give the Beavers 8-0 and 14-6 leads scoring all of the Beaver points and making several key runs in a performance similar to his clutch play in last year's contest.

BUT THE WEBFOOTS had their glory too, as they scored once in the second period following an intercepted pass which center Joe Clesceri returned to the Beaver 20, and a final time in the fourth quarter on a 58 yard drive that included a pair of favorable roughing penalties and two Dave Grosz to Kent Peterson passes.

The scoring spotlight in that final drive was focused on tiny Cleveland Jones who passed the last eight yards to end Paul Bauge and followed that up by carrying over the extra point on a tricky double reverse.

The Staters, with the score tied and less than six minutes to go, took the kickoff after Jones' extra point and from their own 42 drove down to the Duck eleven yard line.

WITH BARELY a minute left, Kasso tried a pair of unsuccessful end sweeps and threw an incomplete pass in the end zone. That left 19 seconds on the clock, and the crowd of 27,009 on the edge of their seats.

Beaver coach, Tommy Prothro, masterminding the struggle from the press box, called on quarterback Tim Ankersen to try for the crucial goal. The young sophomore's attempt was wide, ending the game except for a final desperation heave by Dave Grosz that was intercepted.

The outcome of the tilt left the University of Oregon ahead in the 64 year series, 30 wins to 25 losses and nine ties.

In the last six years since Tommy Prothro has arrived at Oregon State, the series is even with each school winning two, losing two, and tying two.

THE BATTLE Saturday could be the last for most of the twelve seniors on the Duck squad unless

the Webfoots get a hoped-for bowl bid by one of the three bowls that has been considering them.

However, there are three seniors who are not finished with collegiate football. Dave Grosz and Cleveland Jones have been invited to the All-America game in Tuscon, and Grosz also will perform in the Hula Bowl.

To top the individual honors received by the Webfoots, Dave Urell has been offered a coveted berth in the East-West Shrine game in Kezar Stadium.

THE STATISTICS in Saturday's battle write a revealing story, agreeing with the score in that the game was a close one. The Ducks led by a slight margin of 238 yards to 193 in total yards gained, while the Beavers had ten first downs to the eight of Len Casanova's crew.

The Webfoots, however, were far superior to OSC in the air,

completing eight of 20 passes for 97 yards to one of ten completed tosses and eleven yards for the Beavers. This pass was the first one Oregon State has completed against Oregon in the last four years.

Dave Grosz ended his career of three years under coach Casanova in second place to George Shaw in total offense for a University of Oregon player. Grosz needed 183 yards to overtake Shaw, but compiled only 93 in the tilt.

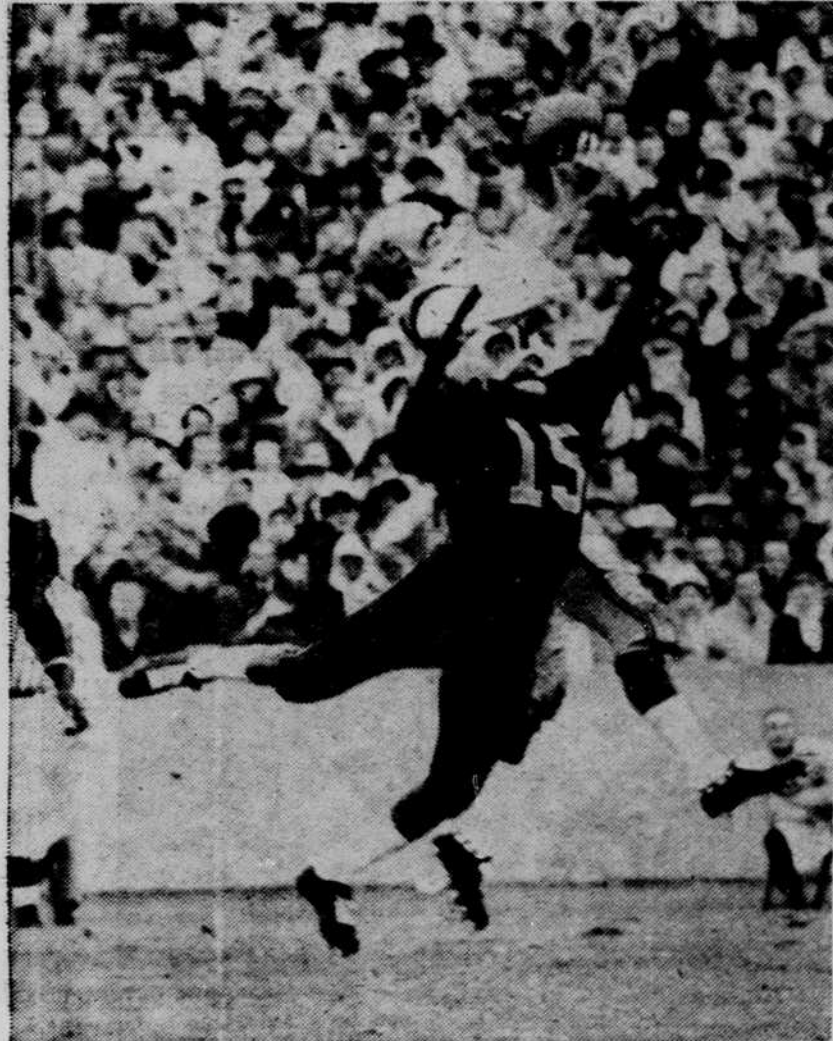

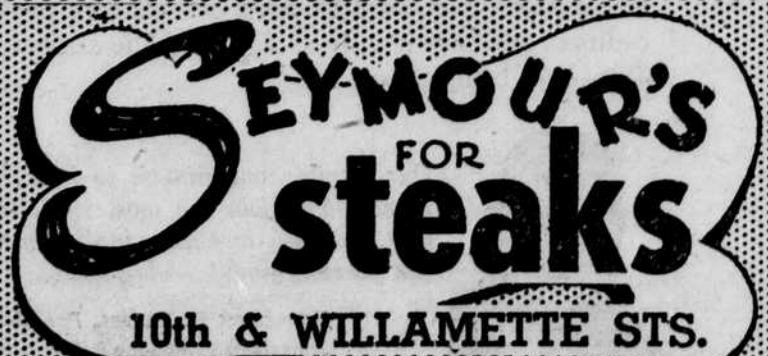
