

Varsity swimmers lose to Ducklings

A powerful freshman swim squad edged the varsity swimmers 51-46 in the annual frosh-varsity meet Saturday morning in the University of Oregon pool.

The frosh gained the decision as a result of a victory in the 400 yard freestyle relay, the final event in the meet. Besides earning them the victory, the team's winning time of 3:34.75 gave them a new freshman record in this event, and bettered the mark of last year's varsity, who set the old record against the University of Washington in the 1959 Northern Division Championships.

All but one of the winning times bettered the times set in the same meet a year ago.

FOUR other new frosh records were established in Saturday's competition. The 400-yard medley relay team, composed of Pete Fullerton, Mack Hirayama, Norm Swanson, and John Tompkins won their event in the record-smashing time of 4:08.6.

Other freshman who bettered old marks were Arthur Thomson, winner of the 100 yard freestyle event, Pete Fullerton who took a second place behind Gary Dahl in the 200 yard backstroke competition, and Mack Hirayama, first in the 200 yard breaststroke event.

Two varsity records were also wiped out in the meet. The 400 yard medley relay team, composed of Gary Dahl, Tom Herman, Mike Hastings, and Ron Nakata, although taking a second spot to the frosh team, still came through in the record-breaking time of 4:09.6. Mike Hasting set a new standard in the 200 yard butterfly race with a mark of 2:22.45.

ARTHUR THOMSON, in addition to his triumph in the 100 yard freestyle, came across the line first in the 220 yard freestyle event, to stand as the only

swimmer to grab two meet victories in individual competition.

Pete Meuleveld, Dave Boyd, Rick Friberg, and Tom Herman all contributed five point victories to the losing varsity cause. Meuleveld copped a win in the 200 yard individual medley, Friberg took the diving competition, Boyd led the field in the 50 yard freestyle event, and Herman set the pace in the 440 yard freestyle.

Swim coach Don Van Rossen was pleased with the results of the meet, and is very optimistic in regard to the coming season.

DU, Theta Chi IM net victors

Delta Upsilon "B" and Theta Chi "B" took wins in last Thursday's Intramural Volleyball tournament. The D.U. forces dropped Chi Psi, and Theta Chi beat Phi Kappa Sigma.

The four other scheduled matches ended with forfeit wins. Chi Phi forfeited to the Delta Tau Delta "B" team. Yeomen forfeited to Canard "A". The Legal Eagle "A" forfeited to Campbell Club. Tau Kappa Epsilon took a forfeit decision over Lambda Chi Alpha.

The Delts took the first game from Chi Psi, 15-11, but the Chi Psis came back to even things up with a 15-7 win in the second contest. The D.U.s took the final match and the victory with an easy 15-5 win.

The Theta Chis were only able to field a three man squad, but still managed to drop the Phi Kappa Sigmas in two straight sets. They took the first one 15-6, and clinched the win with a 15-11 victory in the second.

Frosh drop Rooks, 6-0

The Oregon Frosh ended an undefeated-untied season last Friday afternoon, taking a hard fought 6-0 decision from the Oregon State Rooks on Hayward Field's muddy gridiron.

The only score of the game came in the second period on a seven yard aerial from Frosh quarterback Bob Berry to end Dick Imwalle. The play culminated a 31 yard march that started when Mel Renfro recovered a fumble in the Rook backfield. The try for the extra point failed.

The Frosh threatened to score several other times when they pushed their way deep into Rook territory only to surrender the ball on fumbles or pass interceptions.

IN THE FOURTH quarter the Rooks threatened to score, moving the ball on two successive drives inside the Frosh ten yard line but each time coach John Robinson's Ducklings were equal to the occasion, containing the Rooks on both fourth and one situations.

An estimated crowd of 2,000 watched the Frosh roll almost at will although unable to push the ball into the end zone.

Renfro again proved to be the strong man of the Frosh offensive attack, picking up 59 yards in 14 carries. He also intercepted a Rook pass, recovered a fumble and caught a 21 yard aerial from Berry.

HALFBACK Monte Fitchett and fullback Lucious Bain added sting to the Frosh forces. Fitchett rambled for 47 yards in 11 tries and Bain gained 49 yards in 17 tries.

Duckling signal-caller Berry completed 6 of 11 passes for 78 yards and one touchdown.

Tailback Rich Shields led the Rooks offensively, picking up 81 yards running and completing two of nine passes for 15 yards. Rook fullback Bruce Williams gained 35 yards in 13 carries.

The 6-0 score was exactly the same score by which the Frosh (Continued on page 6)
