How would you like to have a world champion for your physical education teacher? This will be the case for Springfield high school students next Monday, Jan. 16, when Otis Davis goes on the payroll there.

The Olympic champion and graduate of the University of Oregon will start on a new phase of his life when he takes over the recently vacated position.

DAVIS WHO won the 400 meters and anchored the 1600 meter relay team last summer in Rome has been doing practice teaching and going on lecture tours since his return.

There was no indication that he would be assigned any coaching duties at Springfield.

Civil Service Asks For More Wages

A \$15 million grant for Civil Service salary adjustments has been asked of the Oregon Legislature by Gov. Hatfield. Mr. Ralph Wheeler, neighboring district director of the Oregon State Employees Association, presented this message to local members at their meeting in the Student Union Jan. 10.

Gov. Hatfield stated that there is a 50 per cent turnover in state employees each year and it is too expensive to continuously train employees who are enticed away by private industries offering better pay. The salary adjustments should alleviate this situation.

WHEELER also reported that the Wages and Means Interim Committee is still studying plans to improve the State Retirement System to make it more comparable to those of California and Washington. A report will be released in the immediate future.

Discussed at the meeting was the rapid growth of O.S.E.A. membership on the University campus. Statewide, over 61 per cent of the 17,500 state employees are now members of O.S.E.A. Chapters are jointly aiming at an increase of membership to at least 80 per cent before the Oregon Legislature ends.
