

Study Program In Swedish Open

Special programs for English-speaking students for the 1961-62 academic year will be offered at the University of Stockholm, Sweden. No previous knowledge of the Swedish language is required for enrollment in the program.

Operating on the graduate school and junior year level, the programs allow the student to acquire knowledge of Swedish through intensive research work study. This would enable them to attend university lectures in Swedish.

The International Graduate School diploma course leads to a master's degree and is open to students who have received a bachelor's degree at an American college or university.

The one-year program offers seminars in economics, government, administration, social welfare, and international relations.

Stockholm University's junior year consists of a Scandinavian language program, an introductory course, six lecture courses, and three seminar courses.

All instruction is given in English by Swedish university instructors. Textbooks also are in English.

Lecture courses include international relations, government, economic geography, social structure and problems, literature, and history of art. Tuition is set at \$500.

A number of scholarships are offered for both the graduate and junior studies. Further information is available at the foreign student office, Emerald Hall.

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rally that gained them a 32-25 edge.

The Cougars seemed determined to win this one and would not let up, scoring as often as they had the chance and forcing the Ducks to press and take desperate last chance shots.

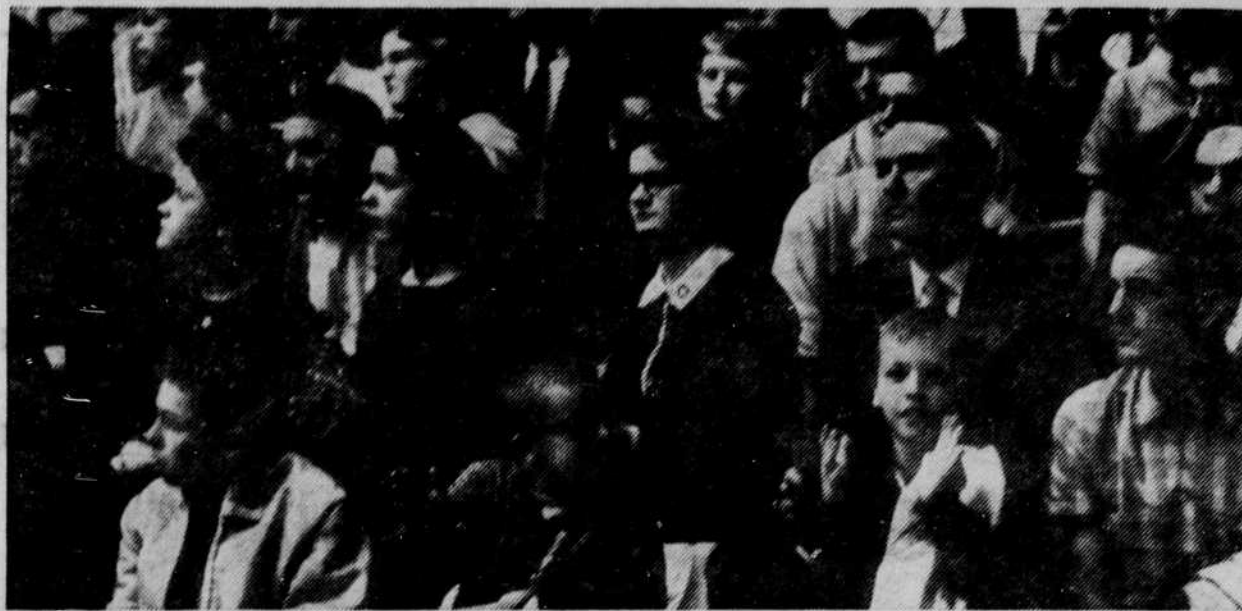

House Approves OSC Name Change

Legislation to change the name of Oregon State College to Oregon State University was passed, 43-9, Friday by the Oregon House of Representatives and sent to the Senate.

Nobody spoke against the bill, but there was considerable good-natured ribbing during the discussion.

Representative Carl Fisher from Eugene made a surprise move by asking unanimous consent to change the name to Oregon Agricultural College. His

move was blocked, however.

Representative Richard Eyemann remarked, "If the present trend of changing colleges to universities continues, is there a probability that the College of Cardinals might be changed to the University of Cardinals."

Spaceship Launched

MOSCOW (UPI)—A Russian spaceship carrying a Soviet flag in its nose was launched on a three-month trip to the planet Venus Sunday. The Soviet Union first put a new Sputnik into orbit around the earth, then triggered the separation of the piggy-back spaceship for its long-range probe. The Soviet news agency Tass said a special space center is tracking the rocket and recording data transmitted by its radios.

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depends upon the circumstances of each case. If the student is treated by the criminal courts as any other person would be, Hawk says, the University does not attempt to duplicate the punishment.

In the case of minors caught for being in possession, however, they are generally put on probation from the University. If it is a second offense, or a major one, the student's car may be sent home. Sometimes the student is suspended.

SUSPENSIONS are generally not total, Hawk says. The students may be suspended for a quarter or until they prove their maturity, say in the service or at a junior college.

"Very rarely do we suspend a student with the idea that he can't come back," Hawk says.

One final note. Also over the weekend a car pulled onto the lawn in front of Allen Hall, got stuck, and left ruts nearly a foot deep. First reports indicated it was a University student. It was not. According to observers those in the car were area high school students.

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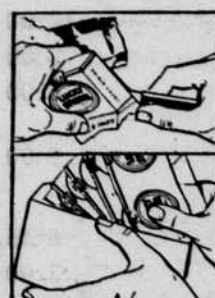
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
