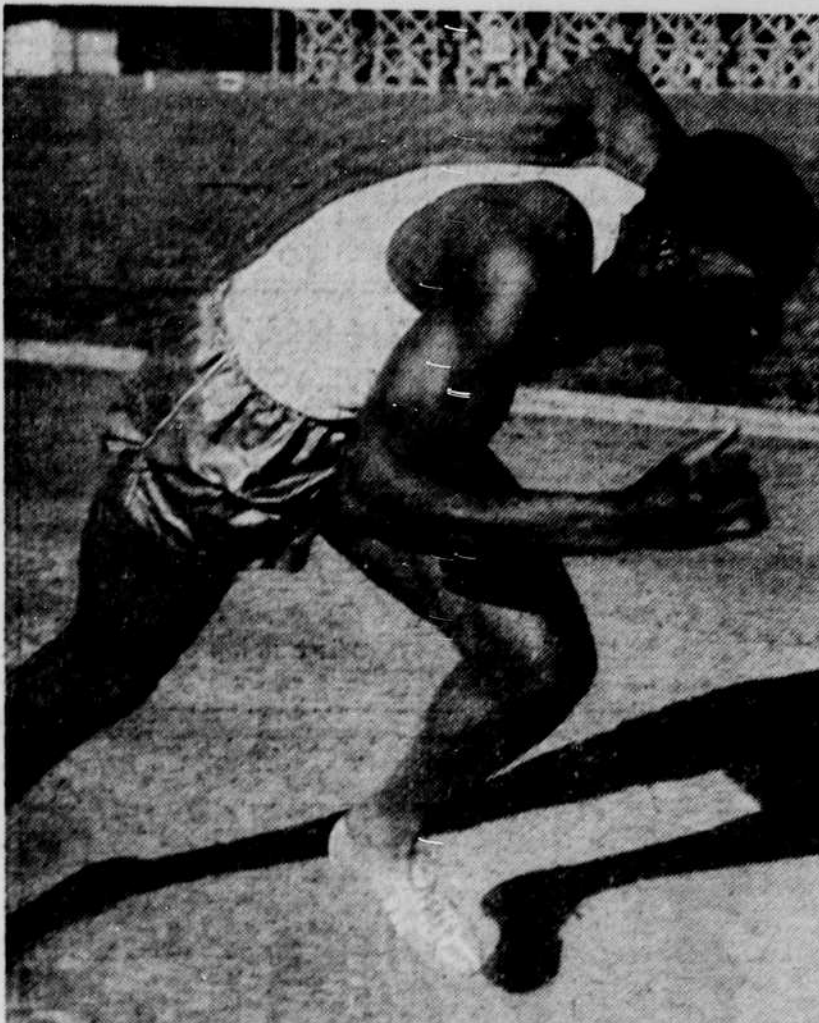

Ducks Prepare For OSU Meet

It will be the Ducks vs. the Beavers Saturday afternoon at Bell Field in Corvallis in what may be Oregon's stiffest test against a northwest track team since 1953. Oregon State hasn't defeated the Ducks since 1948.

OSU, WITH five dual meet victories already tucked away, probably has the finest team in its school history. But Oregon, an easy victor over Idaho in its only dual meet this season, may also have the best team in history. Certainly it is the best balanced team ever seen here.

As usual, Coach Bill Bowerman doesn't show the slightest hint of optimism. "Their injuries have hurt them all season long," he says, "and they didn't come up with their best performance when we beat them in the Far West Relays two weeks ago." Beaver mentor Sam Bell hasn't expressed any optimism, but neither has he conceded the meet to Oregon.

ON THE BASIS of best times to date, either team could win. But track being a "good weather" sport, it is difficult to compare teams that have competed under different weather conditions.

Most of OSU's best performances were recorded during their three meets in California last month. Their slower times and shorter distances at Pullman and Seattle the last two weeks would seem to indicate an Oregon win when the two teams meet head-on.

BUT OREGON may be a week or so behind the Beavers on the basis of conditioning. However, the Ducks' surprisingly easy victory in the Far West Relays in their first outing and the crushing win over Idaho last week indicates that OSU's experience of having had three more meets may have little or no bearing Saturday.

Oregon will be at full strength, but the Beaver lineups may be without any number of their top performers. They've had so many injuries this season, it is hard to tell from one week to the next who they will have on the track when the first race begins.

THE MEET will begin at 1:30 with the field events. The first running event, the mile, is scheduled for 2:00. Special bleachers have been erected around Bell

Field to accommodate the large crowd that is expected.

Beta, Gamma, IM Victors

Six hard fought and exciting IM baseball games marked yesterday's action with six teams emerging victorious, most of them by one-sided scores.

PHI KAPPA SIGMA pounded out a victory over Pi Kappa Alpha by a score of 7-4. The winners were able to get only two hits while the losers got three in the contest that was close all the way.

Alder house managed to make use of six hits to score seven runs as they beat Stafford hall to the tune of 7-5. Stafford only got two hits, but took advantage of several errors to get their five runs in the four inning contest.

PHI SIGMA KAPPA got four hits and ten runs, but still didn't get enough as Philadelphia used only two hits to get 14 runs and trounce the Phi Sigs 14-10.

Gail Prichard pitched the win for Philadelphia, giving up only four hits while his teammates committed error after error in allowing the 10 runs.

DICK IMWALLE pitched one hit ball and gave up only one run as he lead Gamma hall to 12 to 1 victory over McClure hall.

Gamma combined eight hits to get their 12 runs and got six of them in the first inning and six in the third.

BETA THETA PI walked all over Theta Chi, behind pitcher Jack Peterson's two-hit effort, by a score of 10 to 1.

The Beta's got twelve hits and six runs in the fourth inning on their way to the victory. They got five hits in the first, three in both the second and third, and only

one hit in their big fourth inning. Omega hall pounded Clark hall 10-1 behind the pitching of Ed Mayeda in the last contest of the day. Omega got 12 hits and 10 runs while Clark got four hits and one run.

There are no more games until next Monday on the IM schedule because of the Hayward relays. In Monday's action the big

games will probably be Sigma Alpha Epsilon vs. Sigma Nu and Sheldon vs. Morton. In two games thus far this season Sheldon pitcher Ken Kalina has given up only one hit (a bunt) and has not allowed the ball to leave the infield.

The first round of baseball action will end next Thursday, April 20.

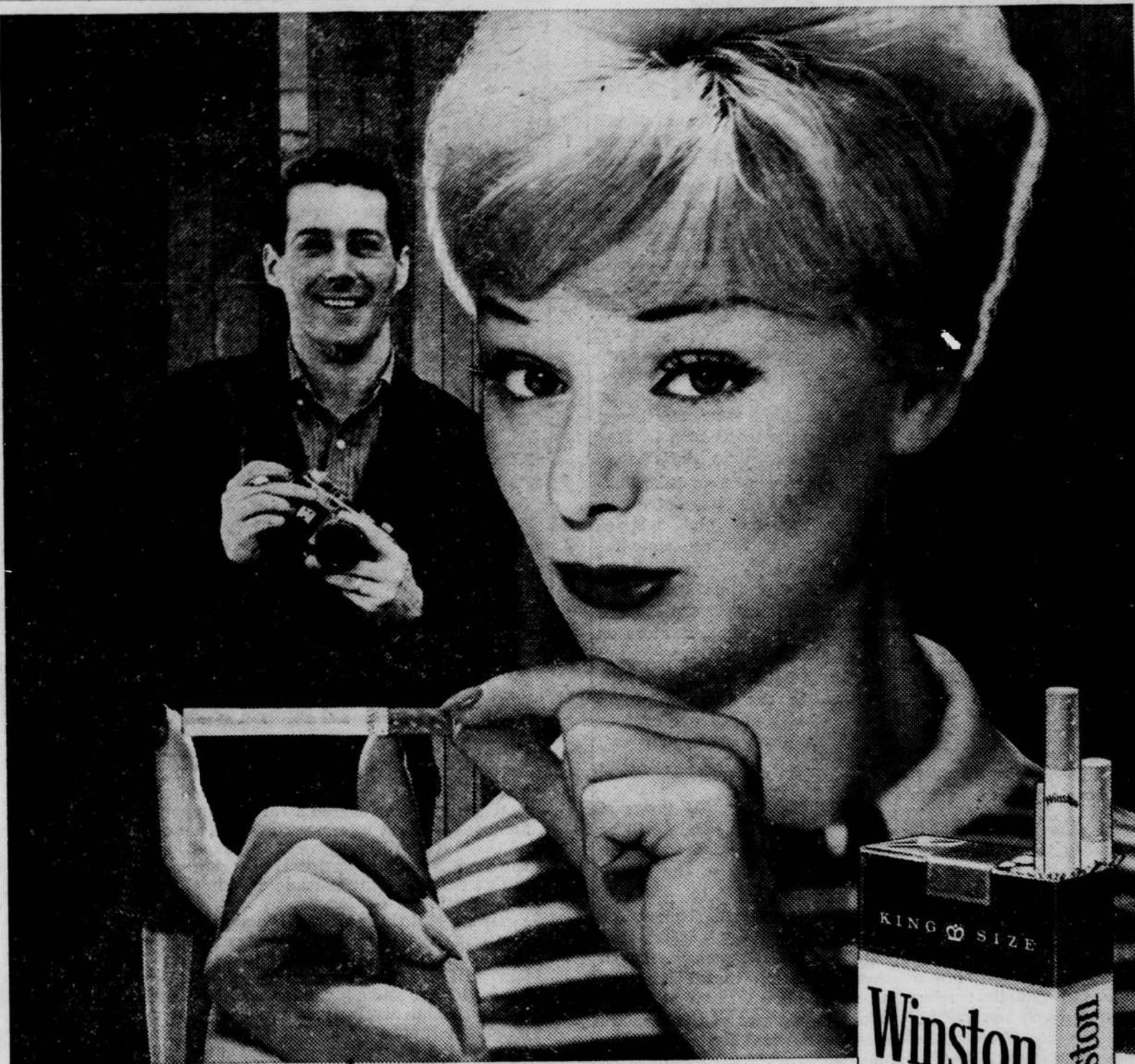
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
