Boland Stresses Value Of UN in Today's World

"Whoever wanted a quiet life did badly to be born into the twentieth century."

Using this quote by Leon Trotsky, Ambassador F. H. Boland, president of the 15th session of the UN assembly, explained the importance of the United Nations in the world today. Boland spoke last night to the first plenary session of the MUN in McArthur Court.

"THE SAD fact is that the situation in the United Nations Assembly is merely a reflection of the situation in the world. Because the Assembly of the United Nations mirrors the world as it is."

Boland told the grave social and economic discontents that threaten world peace, mentioning that economic under-development represents a grave danger to the course of freedom.

"THE possibility always exists that men and women in less developed areas of the world, finding that national independence by itself has not brought them the education, the welfare and the living standards for which they hoped, may lose faith in the

freedom they have won and passively surrender their personal liberties to some form of totalitarian rule."

Boland mentioned that the countries of the world believe lack of effective national government spells chaos and anarchy,

yet they accept it in world society.

"Perhaps future generations will see this in a different light." As yet, he went on, there are no governments willing to accept the sacrifices of sovereignty required to make the UN a more effective instrument of the world government than it is.

STILL, according to Boland, the Assembly has become "the town meeting of the world to a greater extent than before."

The United Nations has also become the most powerful medium in the world today for gathering public opinion and concentrating them on critical issues of international conduct and policy. By doing so, it helps to keep the world political conscience active and alert and, when necessary, to give it positive and clear expression.

"THAT, in my opinion, is one of the most important functions of the General Assembly," stated Boland.

"WE NEED wider vision, a broader sense of community, a new intellectual horizon, the dawn of a truly international patriotism, in keeping with the common destiny and the common jeopardy of mankind in this nuclear age."

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SU Budget Is Approved

The Student Union Board Wednesday approved a \$10,652 expense budget for the 1961-62 academic year. Projected total income available from SU sponsored functions, budget appropriation, and other sources is \$17,652. Last year's 1961-62 revised budget expenses were \$11,335.

THE EXPENSES are lower this year because the Northwest Art Acquisition program is down \$1,000 from last year's budget.

Paintings to be bought by the SU from their Northwest artists' show to be held in May will run less than anticipated.

SU Board Chairman John Phillips said that he "had acted like Walter Pearson" and "clipped and trimmed" the economic fat from the budget.

For the first time since 1956, a full student salary of \$730 will go to student administrators in the Student Union.

Of the total salary, 40 per cent will go to the Student Union Board Chairmen, 40 per cent to the Directorate Chairmen and 20 per cent to the SU Board Secretary.

Adelle McMillan, SU Program Director, said that salary will be paid to the SU Board Chairman next year because of the exceptional work done by Phillips.

A \$100 cut in the budget for the SU art gallery was restored for additional SU shows. It had been suggested that sponsoring as many shows as usual would take the energies of the creative arts committee better used on the Northwest Art Acquisition Program which is budgeted at \$2,500.

The Board has called petitions for Directorate committee chairman and Board representatives from the various University schools. Petitions are due April 25. Nominations for members-at-large on the Board will be made on the April 26 Board meeting.

The new Board members will be chosen for the May 24th meeting.
