Writing Contests Open to Students

This week the Department of English announced two poetry contests and a short story competition for undergraduate students. Entries for all contests should be turned into the English office by noon Monday, May 12.

The Julia Burgess Award of \$25 is given annually for the best original poem or poems submitted by an undergraduate student. Any type of poetry may be submitted, but short poems should be turned in as a group of three to five.

The Alicia Wood Poetry Award of \$15 is awarded for the most outstanding poem submitted by an undergraduate student.

THE HAYCOX Short Story competition with awards of \$50 and \$100 is open for the best short stories submitted by undergraduate or graduate students.

Entries for all contests should be typed, double spaced, and submitted in duplicate. Those entries for the short story competition should be done in triplicate. The name of the author should not appear on the manuscript but should be enclosed in a separate envelope with the title of the story. The original copies of the winning stories will not be returned. Further information may be obtained in the English office.
