HAWK SAID he would have a number of questions about such a project.

cuts, is it acceptable to do so? I think we have to do some soulsearching as to what methods goodstudents should use. A student might miss part of the learning experience," Hawk said.

Hawk also questioned the competency of the note taker.

HAWK SAID that since Smith distributed flyers he had "no design for deceit."

Kester Svendsen, head of the English department, called the scheme "a fine idea, it's quite all right with me."

HE ADDED, however, that students were "foolish to pay money" for notes.

"The effect will be that in large lecture classes students will be able to cut and keep up the work." Students will be "missing something but if they can cut the mustard when it comes time for a quiz, hurrah for them."

"The Department of English has no objection whatever." Svendsen felt there was "nothing unethical" in such a practice.

"If students prefer reading recorded notes to going to class, it's their business," he said.

W. O. Shanahan, head of the history department said that using such notes was "a gross misunderstanding of the nature of a class."

Shanahan made three points about the sale of transcribed

(1) It is "a questionable moral practice on the part of Mr. Smith."

(2) "Students are unquestionably being cheated because the text and references in the text undoubtedly contain more and better information than those notes. The notes are inferior versions of those handbooks to help students cram for college courses. They are buying a very inferior short cut. I don't condone taking a short cut at any time, and buying an inferior one is to be de-

(3) "It is an unfortunate symptom of the readiness of students to identify a class with just gathering information." The fruitful study of history consists in not only learning information, but in "interpreting and evaluating it."

The notes do not foster "a deeper and more mature intellectual attitude toward this body of information."
