The Chargers have won five straight games to become the only undefeated team in pro football.

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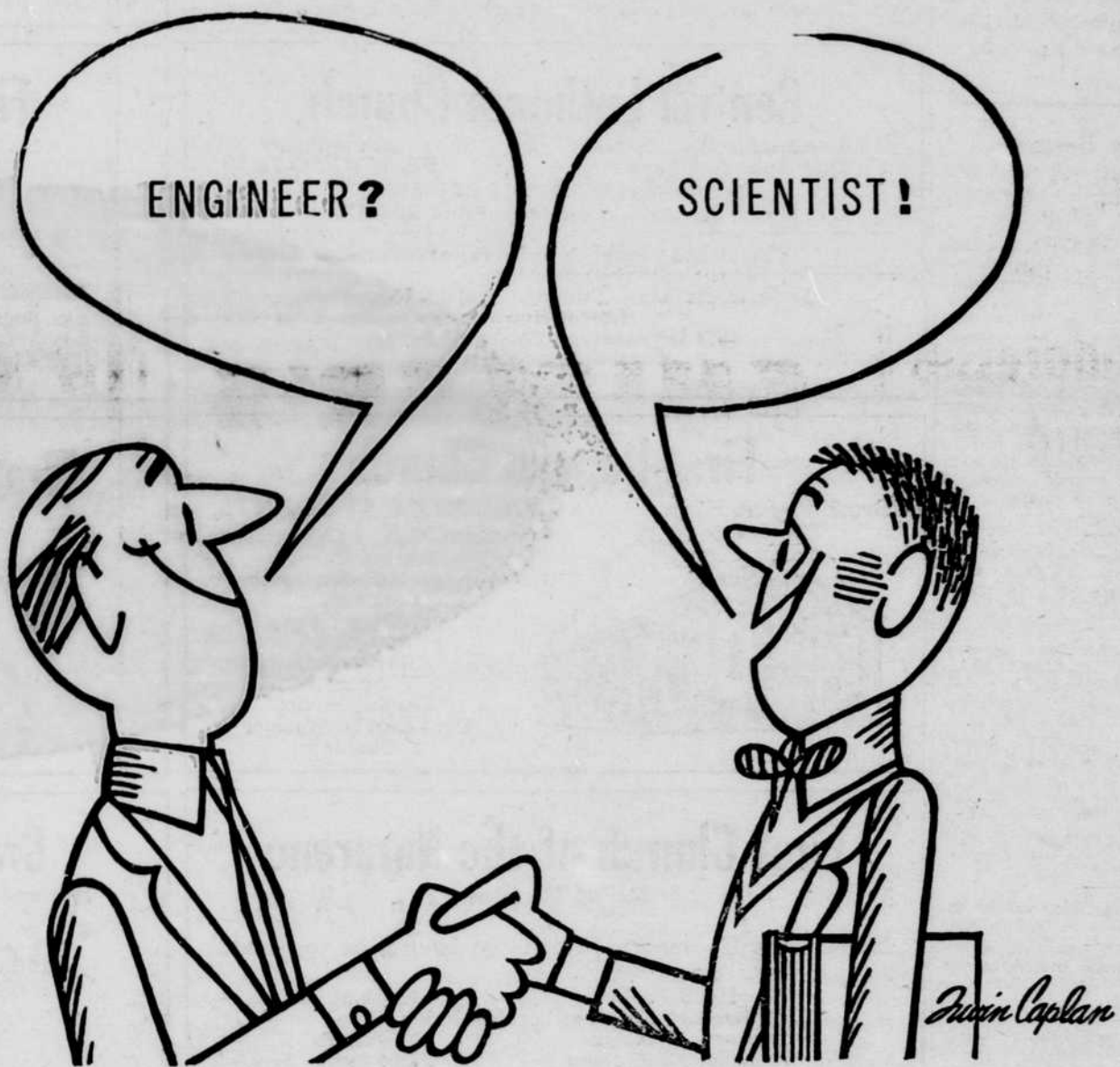
