

Lights dim, clocks stop when library fuse blows

The University Library's electrical system operated at half power most of Saturday before electricians and physical plant personnel discovered the trouble—a blown fuse.

THIS FUSE, however, wasn't one of the little kind that sits in a box on the wall, but controlled one of three parts of a system which normally supplies 2,300 volts to the library.

The fuse, located in the electrical tunnel near Johnson Hall, carried enough carbon when it blew to indicate that there was adequate power to light the library. However, most of the lights remained out, or operated a far less than normal capacity.

NORMALLY A blown fuse can be spotted by looking at it, but this one wasn't that way, and wasn't noticed until searchers came around a second time.

Once seen, it was easily fixed, commented Wilbur Weed, physical plant superintendent.

Sunday afternoon, most of the clocks on the campus were still running about five hours behind time—or seven hours ahead of time depending on how one looks at it.

They were stopped when an alert employee in the library stopped all the electric motors to keep them from burning out. One on these motors was the one that controls the master clock which in turn controls many other clocks on campus.

SEVERAL TIMES it was necessary to shut off all the library's power for a few minutes causing some amount of consternation among people in the windowless parts of the building.

"It was quite annoying," one library staff member commented.

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Student wins national grant

Carol K. Flesher, predoctoral student in psychology at the University, has been awarded a fellowship from the National Institute of Mental Health.

The fellowship is for \$2,000 a year, plus tuition, travel and equipment allowance, and it is for the study of factors that contribute to inter-animal recognition.

Miss Flesher's project is an offshoot of a study of social dominance and aggression in animals that she was pursuing at the University of Florida, where she received her BA and MA degrees and completed one year of predoctoral work.

In the project Miss Flesher plans to set up at the University, she will seek to answer the question of how less aggressive animals learn to recognize a more dominant animal and retreat before they are hurt.

Miss Flesher is studying under the direction of Richard Littman, professor of psychology, and Robert Leary, associate professor of psychology.

their petitions at the assembly. Those definitely planning to petition must attend Tuesday's meeting.

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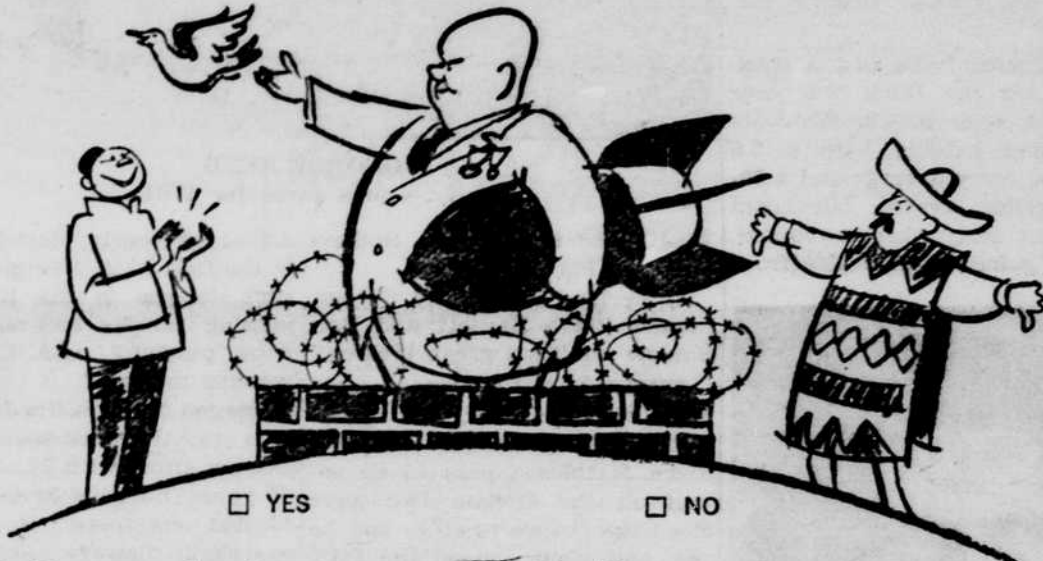


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Check your opinions against L&M's Campus Opinion Poll #11
