

Freshmen extend win streak to six

The well balanced Oregon Frosh football team ran their two year string to six wins and a tie by defeating the Washington Pups, 15-0, Friday on Hayward Field.

John Robinson has not lost a game since taking over head freshman coaching duties a year ago. The Ducklings won four consecutive games last year and are now close to equaling the feat this season.

The Frosh scored the first time they got their hands on the ball. A drive starting on Washington's 36 ended up in the endzone when halfback Cary Tommerason scored from three yards out on a reverse. The kick by Mike Brundage was good.

THE SECOND and final touchdown was made with seconds remaining in the first half. Brundage connected for three passes in a row, the last one to end Corky Sullivan in the endzone with one second left. Ron Martin, halfback, sliced over right tackle for the two-point conversion which rounded out the scoring of the day.

The second stanza was almost entirely dominated by the Pups. Oregon found themselves on the defensive most of the time. Wash-

ington drove to the Duckling's one yard line mid-way in the third quarter only to lose the ball on a fumble.

Both teams found it hard to hang on to the ball and there were 14 fumbles. Oregon fumbled six times and lost the ball on four occasions. Washington fumbled eight times and also lost the ball four times.

The Frosh have had similar trouble in previous games but so far have not suffered too much from it.

TERRY DeSYLVIA, the little quarterback from David Douglas high school in Portland who was expected to give Brundage a good tussle for the QB position, saw considerable action in the contest.

De Sylvia cut the little finger on his right hand working this summer and was not expected to play this year. He turned out two weeks ago and despite the protective splint he wears to cover the cut and the small amount of time he has practiced, the former All-State quarterback looked sharp against the Pups.

The Frosh will round out the season against the Oregon State Rooks Thanksgiving morning, November 24, at Corvallis. Kick-off time is slated for 10 o'clock.

Chargers clinch Western division

The unbeaten San Diego Chargers got a scare from Denver today before downing the Broncos 19-16 and clinching the Western Division title of the American Football League.

The Chargers have now won 10 in a row. Quarterback Jack Kemp passed to Bob Scarpitto with seven minutes remaining in the game to give San Diego its winning touchdown. Kemp also passed for a score to Keith Lincoln in a play that covered 91 yards. Fred Bukaty plunged over from the one yard line and Frank Tripucka passed to Al Frazier for the two Denver touchdowns.

The Buffalo Bills rallied for 20 points in the final quarter to hand the Dallas Texans a 30-20 American Football League loss.

Buffalo capitalized on Dallas mistakes for its win. The Bills' secondary intercepted three passes, turning two of them into touchdowns and recovered a Dallas fumble in the end zone to account for three scores.

Until the Buffalo offense got rolling, Dallas had built up a 20-10 lead on 22 and 51-yard field goals by Ben Agajanian and 14 and 53-yard passes from Cotton Davidson to Johnny Robinson and Frank Jackson.

The Los Angeles Rams stymied the San Francisco "shot gun" offense to score a 17-7 upset victory over the Forty Niners.

The passing of Zeke Zratowski paced the Rams to victory. He completed five passes good for 55 yards on a 74-yard march that ended with his one yard sneak into the end zone. It gave Los Angeles a 10-7 lead which it never lost.

Bill Kilmer scored on an eight yard run to give San Francisco its only score.

The Chicago Bears missed out on their chance to tie Green Bay for the Western Division lead of the National Football League.

The Bears bowed to division leader Green Bay 31-28. The Packers were led by Paul Hornung, playing in his last game before going on active duty in the Army. Hornung scored two touchdowns, kicked a field goal and kicked four conversions.

In the Eastern Division the New York Giants gained a first place tie with Philadelphia by tripping the Eagles 38-21. Elsewhere in the National League Minnesota surprised Baltimore 28-20, and Detroit whipped St. Louis 45-14. Pittsburgh downed Dallas 37-7 and Cleveland beat Washington 17-6 in other games.

Moore defends title

America's Davey Moore makes the fifth defense of his world featherweight championship in Tokyo today.

Dyrol Burleson finished first in the open division of the Oregon AAU cross country championships and a team of Oregon students and alumni representing the Emerald Empire Athletic Association won team honors Saturday afternoon at the Top O'Scott golf course in Milwaukie.

Burleson toured the four-mile course in 19:24. He edged Oregon State's Dale Story by a scant few yards to win the race.

The EEAA team, composed of Burleson, Bill Dellinger, Keith Forman, Archi San Romani Jr., Mike Lehner and Clayton Steinke defeated Oregon State, the first runnerup by over a full minute. Idaho, Washington State, and Portland University also had teams entered in the open division.

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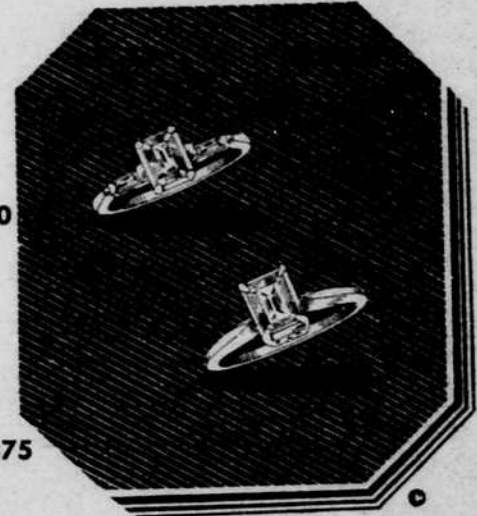
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
