Performances by some of the other actors displayed this same sort of unevenness. They would be quite good in one scene, and just barely adequate in another.

It is to Wismer's credit that the play didn't lag; one quickly went from uninteresting, uninspiring scene to an exciting, comic one.

MICHAEL HALPERN was outstanding as the deluded Orgon. His performance saved scene after scene and kept up audience interest. One should see the play if only to see him—he was truly the spark for the rest of the cast.

Wendy Firman as Orgon's wife and Bill Hall as his son, were also quite good. Barry Swennumson, as the hypocrite, was effectively, "pious."

Technically, the play was quite good. The opening entrance of Louis XVI (majestically played by Robert Eggers) and his courtiers was very effective, as was the opening music (which tended, however, to drown out some of the beginning speech).

The setting added to the story and didn't distract from the play's actions. And the costumes were magnificent; they added much color to the production and helped to make the play come alive.

"Tartuffe", then, offers appeal to both fans of comedy and serious drama. A theater goer who desires an evening of interesting entertainment would be sure to enjoy the play.
